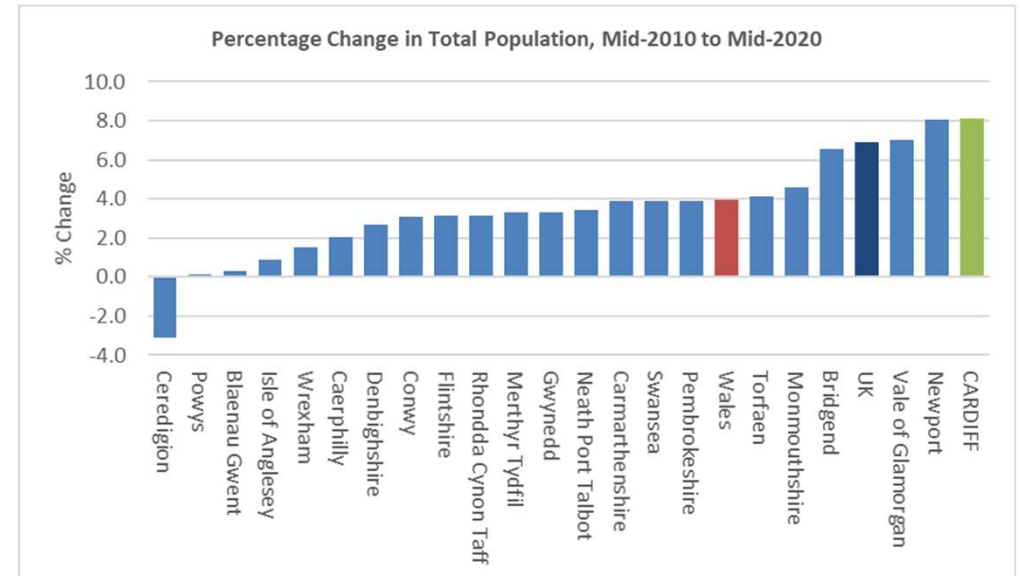
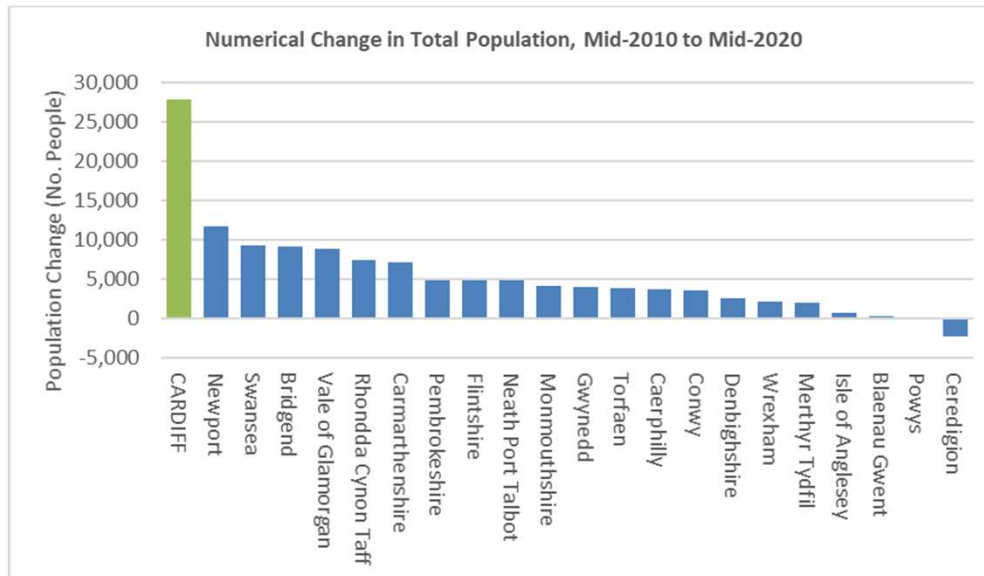

Population Change 2010 - 2020

Key Points:

- Between 2010 and 2020, Cardiff saw the highest levels of population growth in Wales both in numerical terms and as a percentage change in total population.

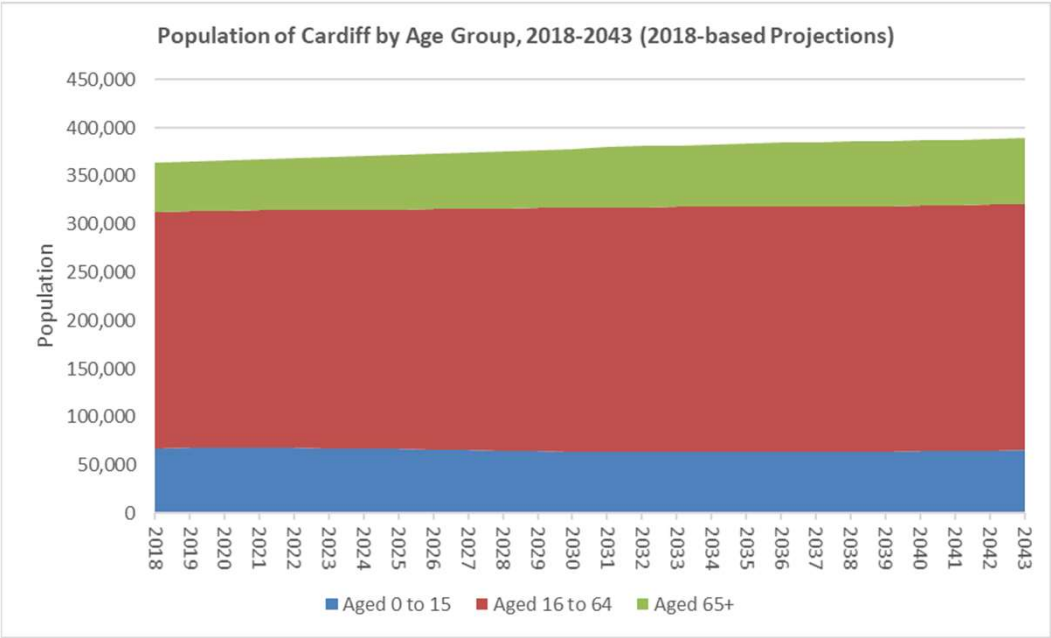

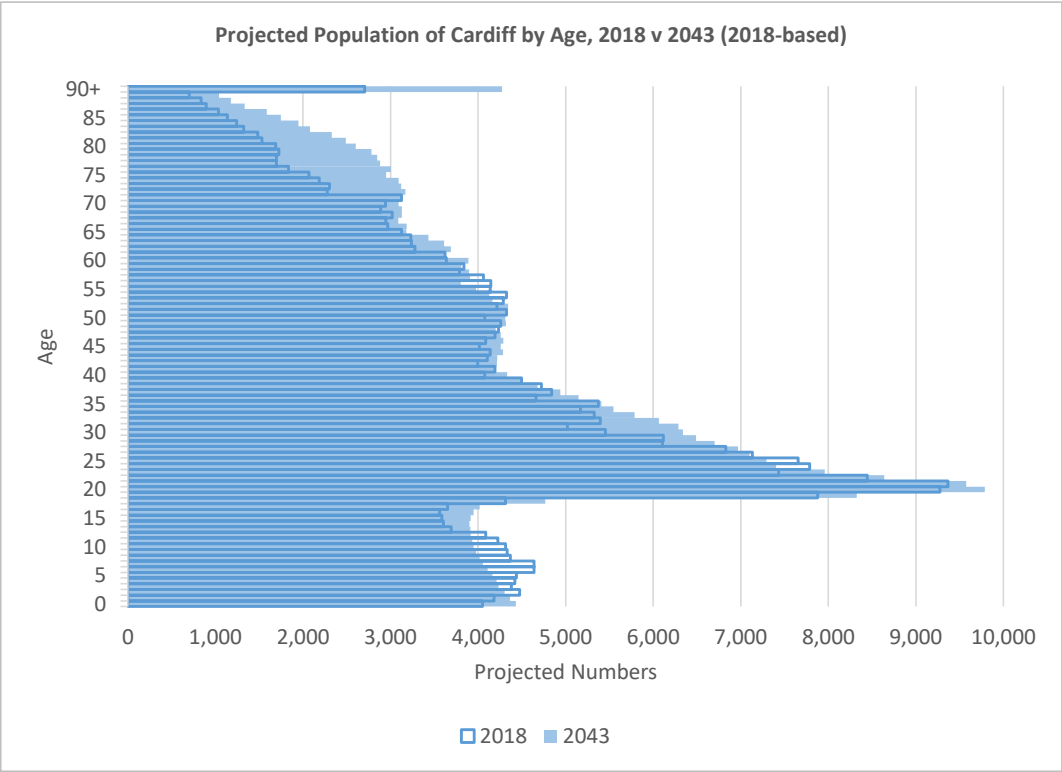
2018-based Local Authority Population Projections by Age Group

Key Points:

- Population projections for Cardiff predict a growth in those aged 65+, increasing from 14.1% of the total population in 2018 to 17.6% in 2043. Proportionally both the 0-15 and 16-64 age categories are projected to decrease by 1.7%, and those aged 0-15 is projected to decline by 2,045.
- Comparing 2018 population with 2043 population projections, the rise in population aged 65+ can be clearly seen. The population breakdown also highlights the younger nature of Cardiff’s population, with higher levels of 18-35 year olds than the rest of the population



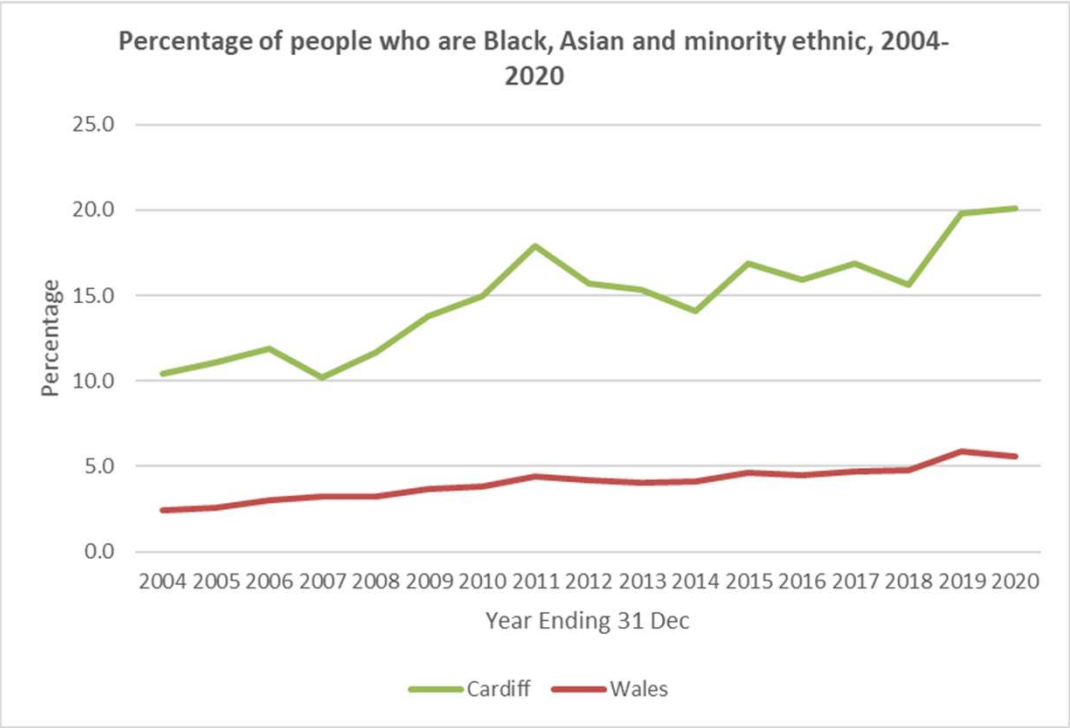
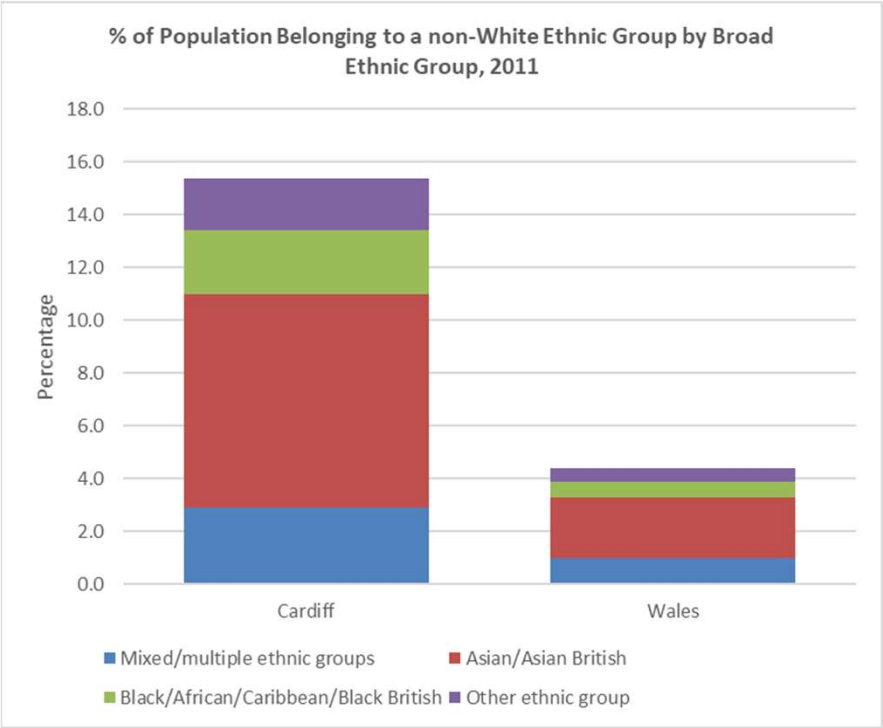

Ethnicity

- Key Points:**
- 15.3% of Cardiff's population belongs to a non-white ethnic group, this is well above the Wales-wide proportion (based on 2011 census).
 - Time series data shows a significant rise in Cardiff in the percentage of people who are black, Asian and minority ethnic, from 10.4% in 2004 to 20.1% in 2020. This compares to a Wales-wide figure of 5.6% of residents who are black, Asian and minority ethnic.

Key Points:

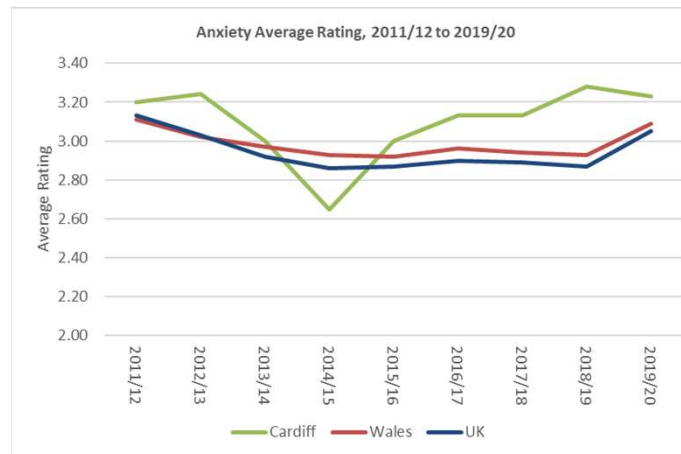
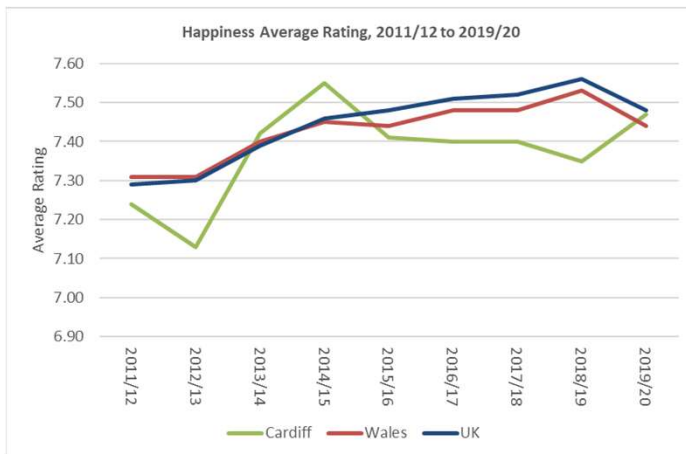
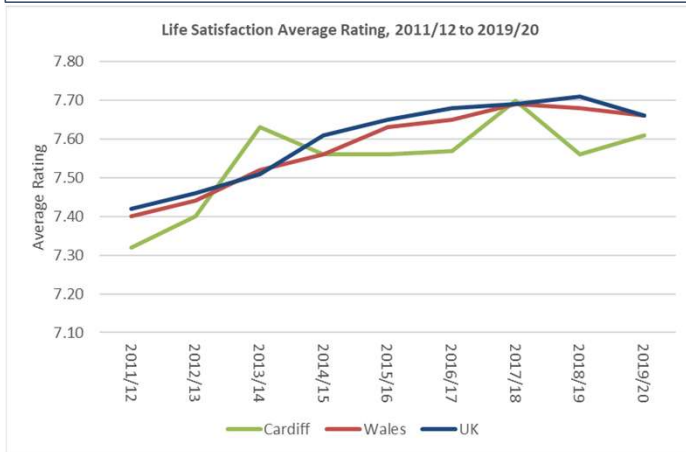
- Second highest core city for Life Satisfaction, but below both the Wales and UK average rating.

- Second highest core city for happiness rating. It is above the Welsh average but below the UK wide average rating.
- Mid-ranked in terms of anxiety, above both the UK and Wales average rating.

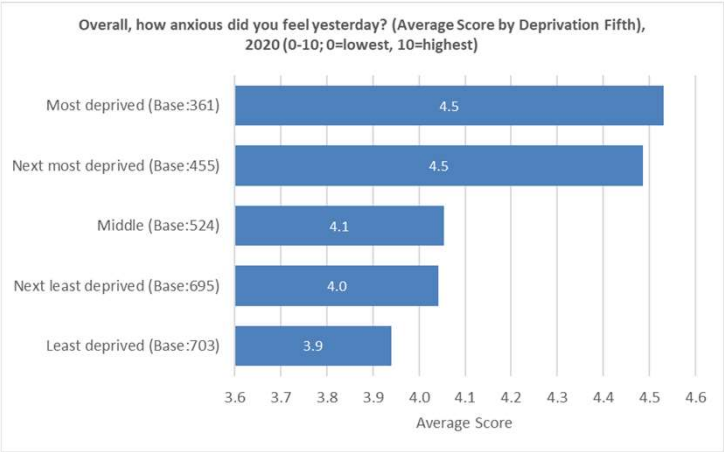
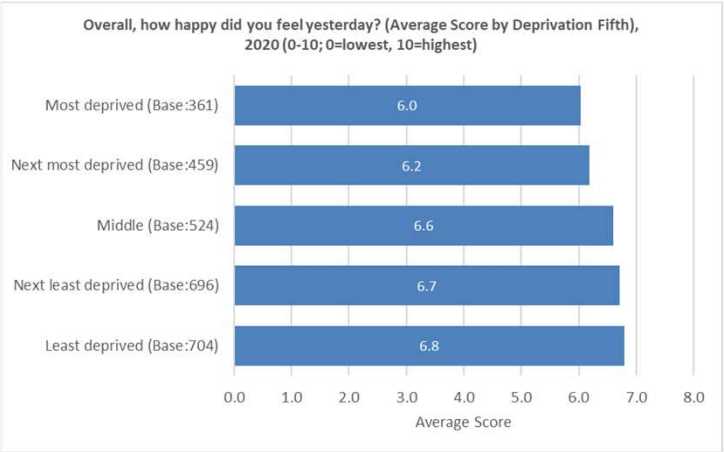
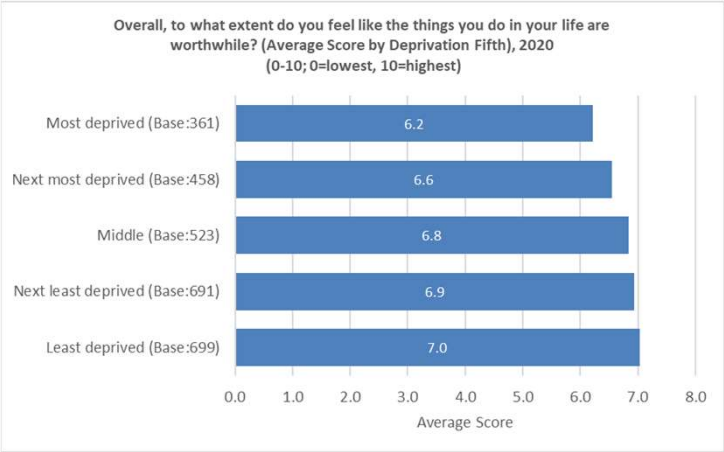
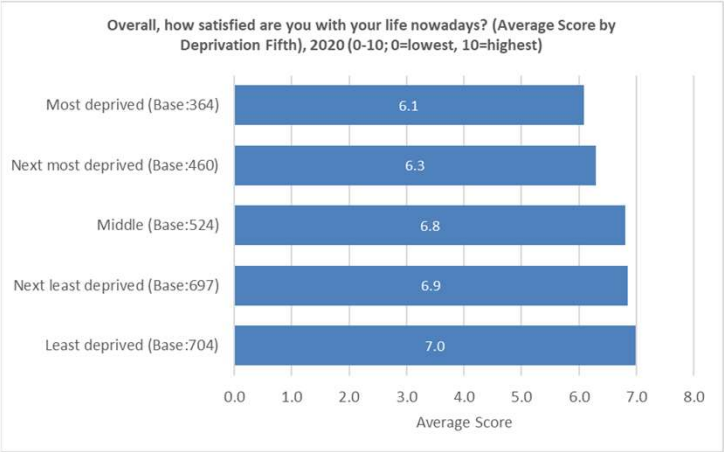
- In 2019/20, Cardiff saw improved levels of Life satisfaction, feeling Worthwhile and Happiness following dips in 2018/19.

- Levels of anxiety have fallen marginally but there has been a general upward trend over the last 5 years.

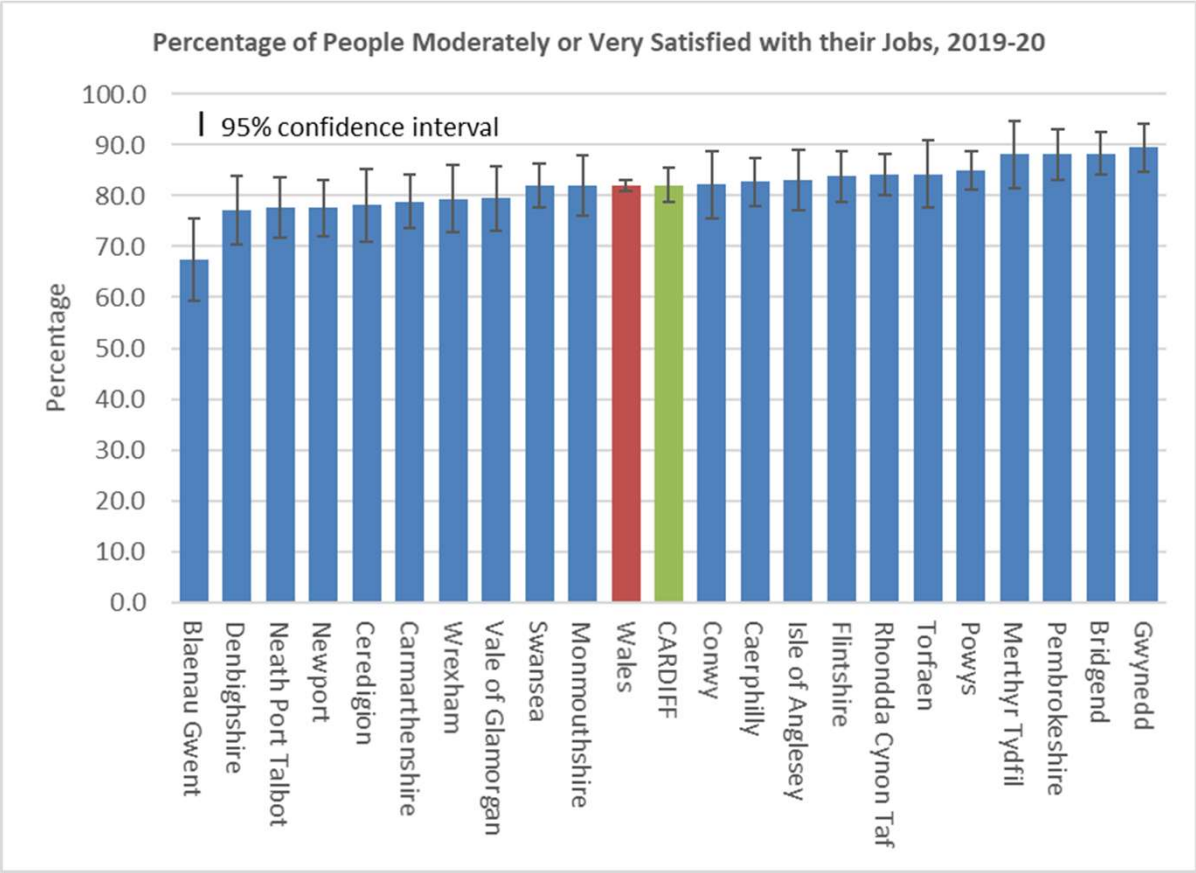

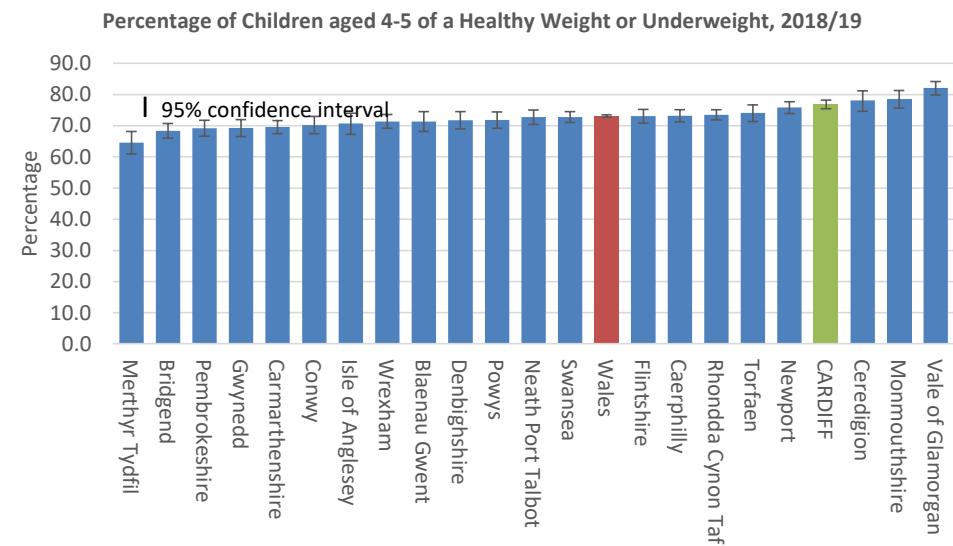
- 2019/20 latest data available

- Since 2016/17, the percentage has increased with a noticeable increase in 2019/20 (from 18.7% to 20.7%)



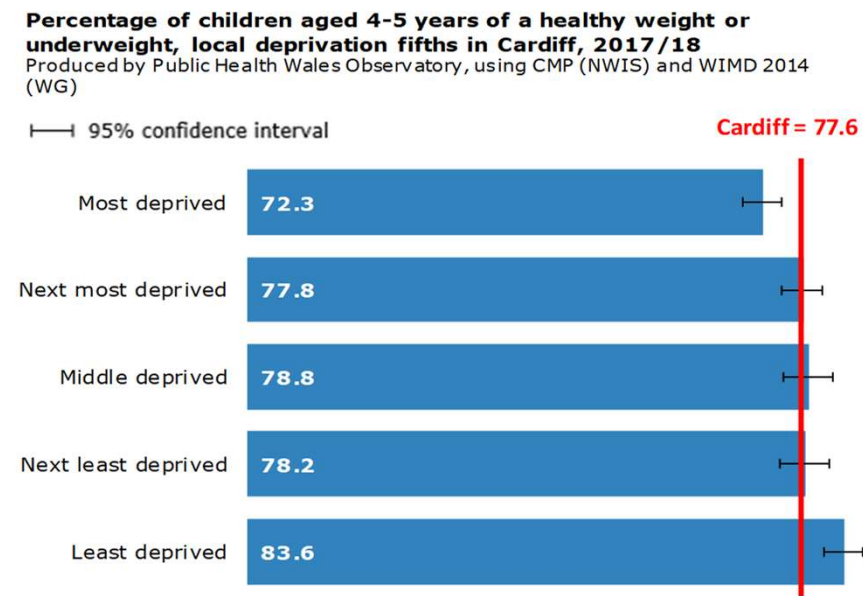
Percentage of children aged 4 to 5 who are a healthy weight

Key Points:

- Cardiff is performing well compared to other Welsh LAs (ranked 4th) and has been above Welsh average consistently since 2012.
- However, over a fifth aged 4 or 5 in Cardiff are over weight or obese, 23.2%
- There is an 11 percentage point difference when comparing Cardiff's least/most deprived communities, with the gap increasing compared to the previous years

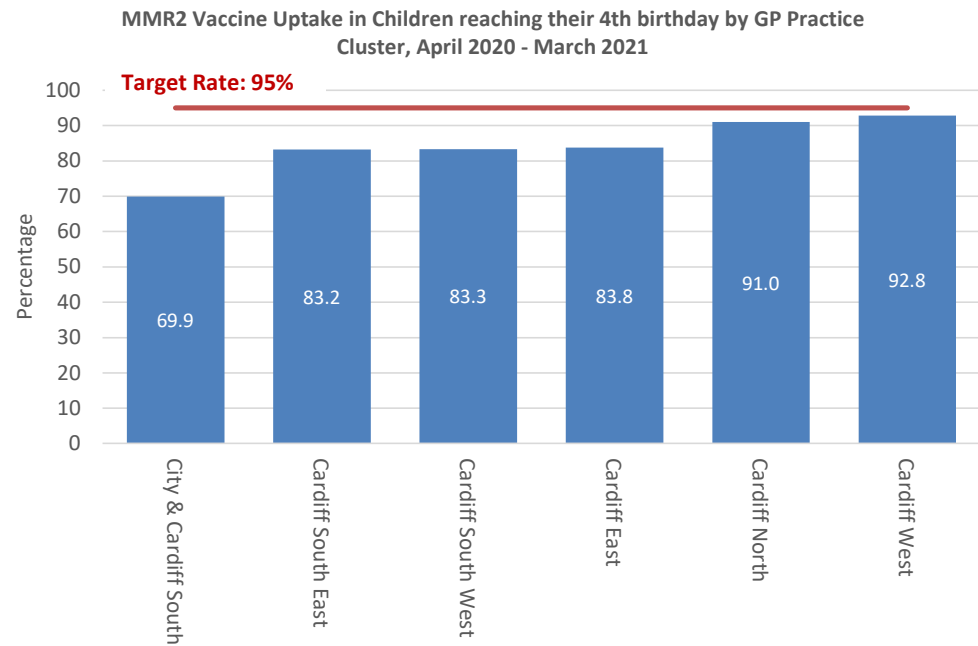
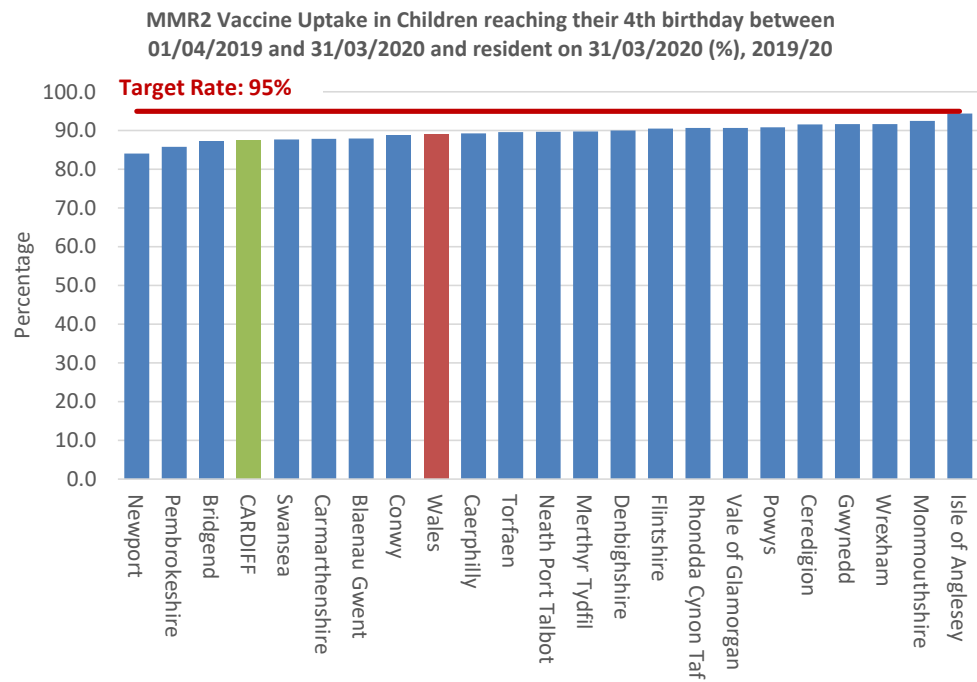

Uptake of MMR2 by age 4

Key Points:

- One of the lowest MMR2 vaccination uptake rates in Wales, 87.4%.
- Target immunisation rate is 95%, although no local authority in Wales currently meets this target.
- The City & Cardiff South GP cluster has particularly low levels of uptake, and has seen a decline in recent years
- The best performing clusters in Cardiff are still below the national target

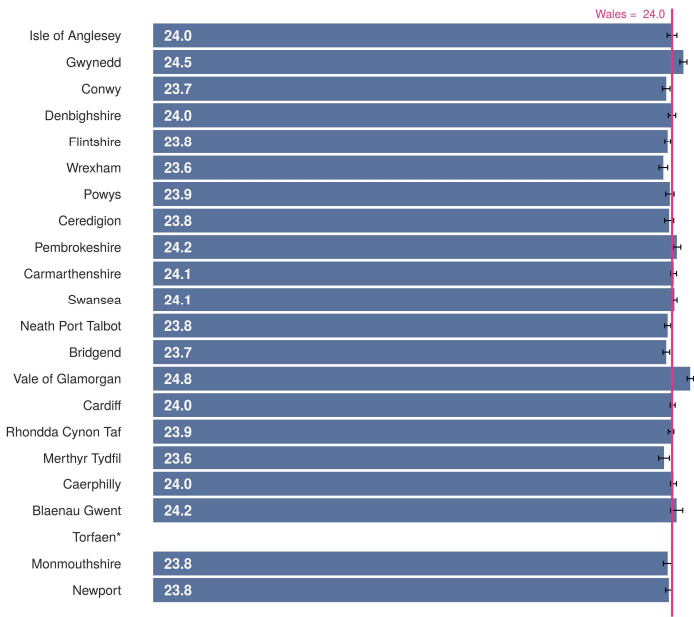
Key Points:

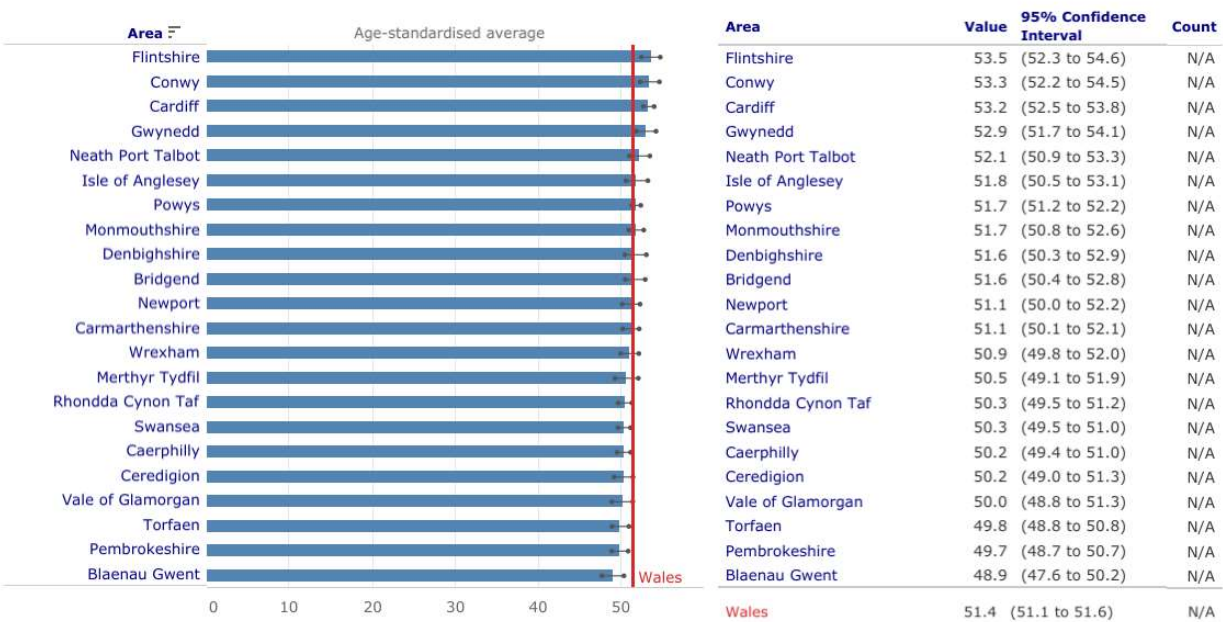

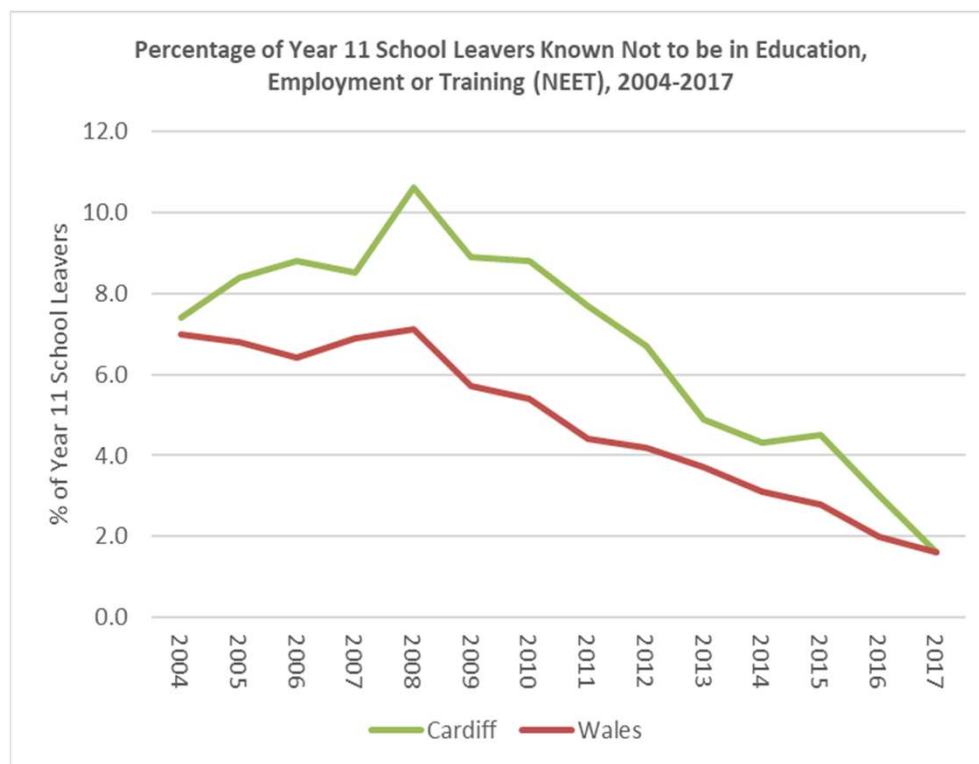
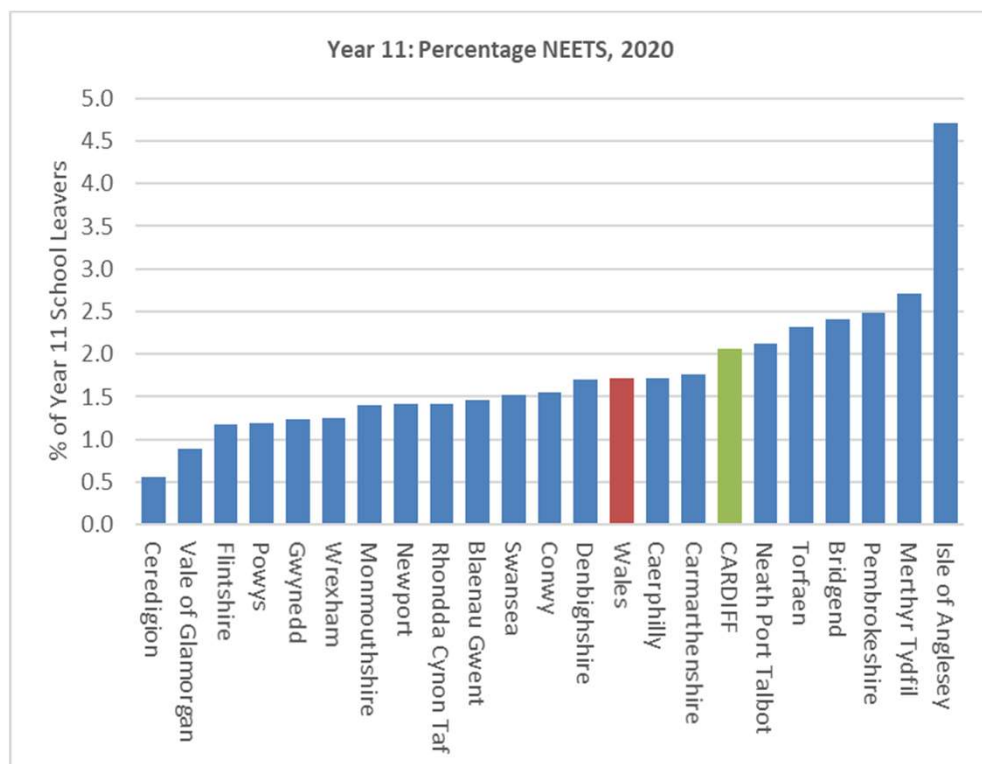

Key Points:

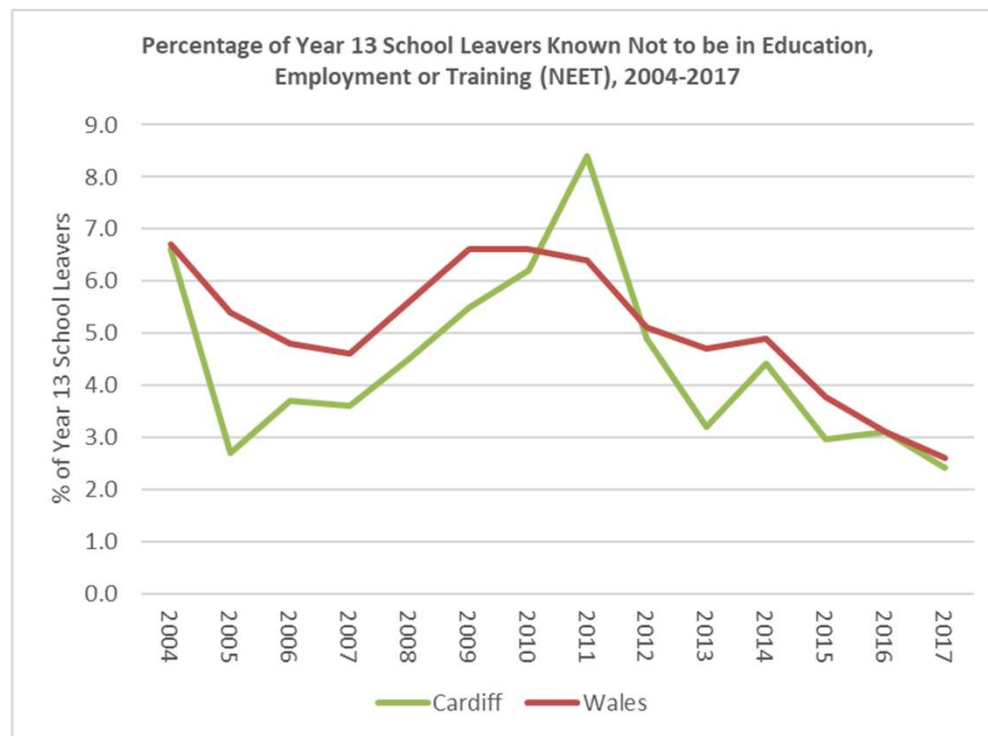
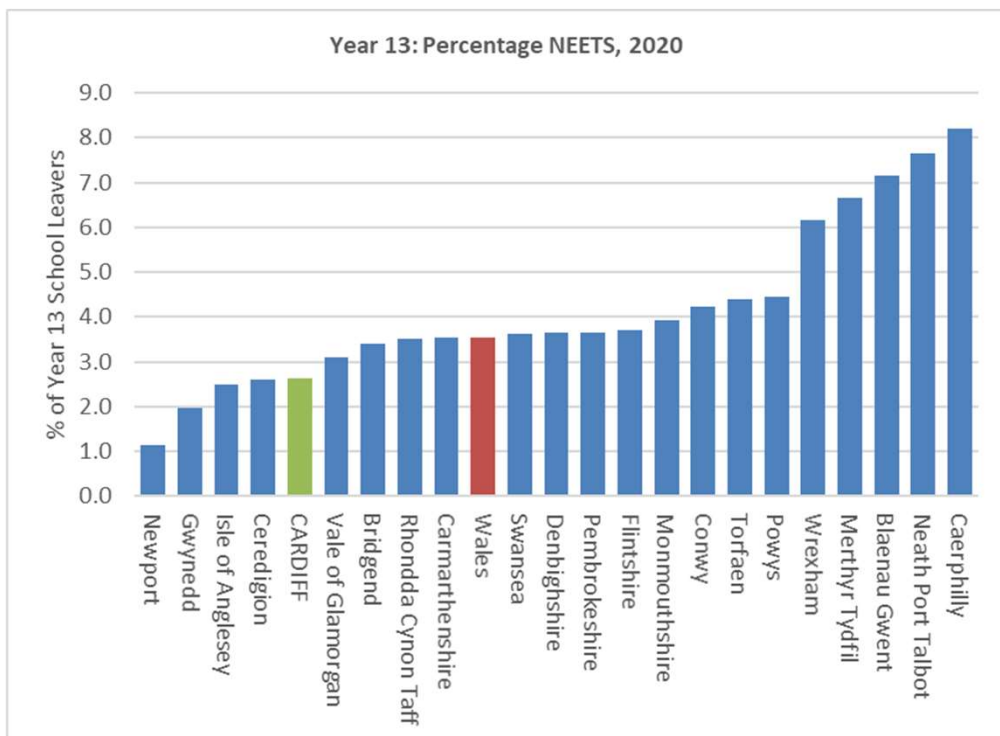
- In 2020, year 11 school leavers not in education, employment or training stood at 2.1%, above the Welsh average of 1.7%.
- However, since 2015, the percentage has more than halved.

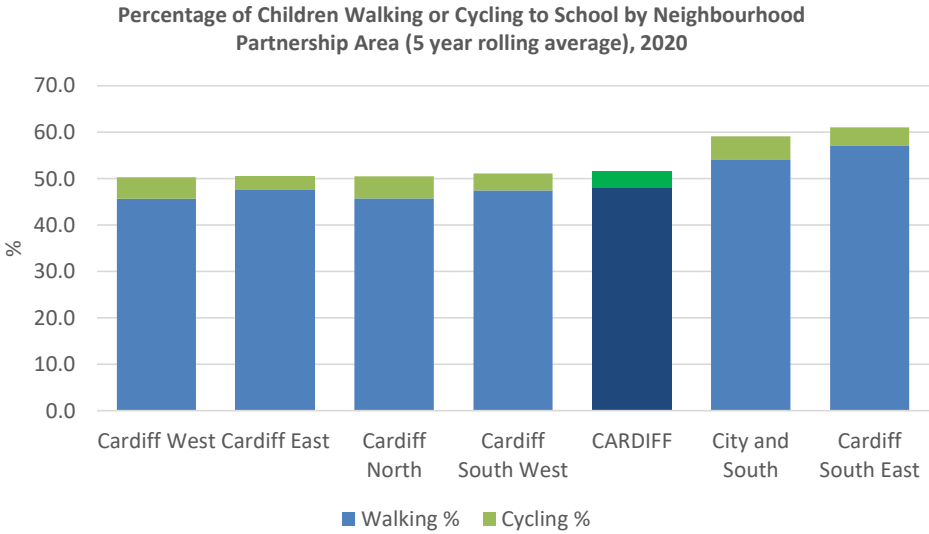
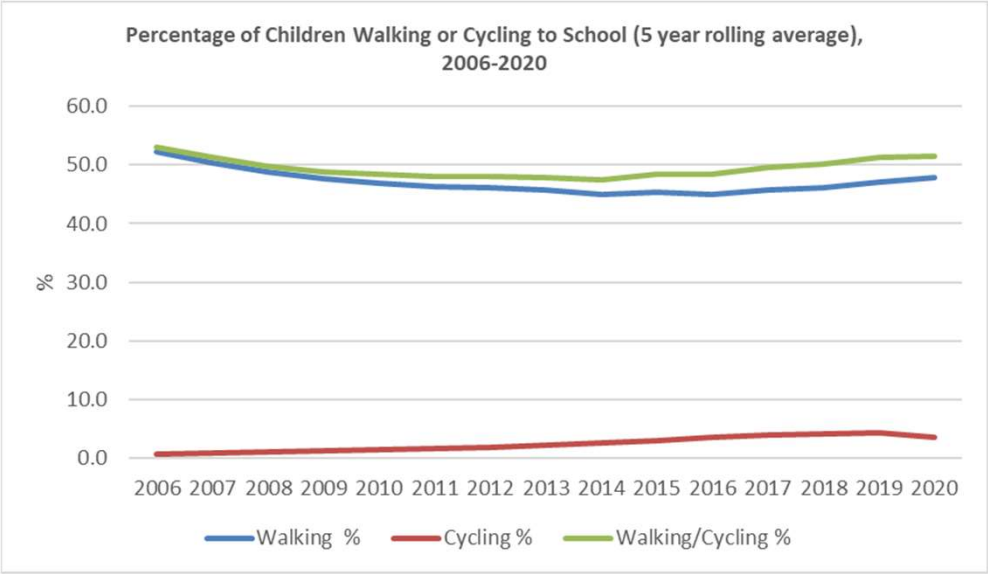
Key Points:

- As opposed to Year 11 school leavers, Cardiff's percentage of year 13 school leavers not in education, employment or training is comfortably below the Welsh average (2.6% compared to 3.5).
- This percentage has been unstable in recent years, as it had consistently fallen between 2016 and 2019, only to increase from 1.9% to 2.6% between 2019 and 2020.

- Key Points:**
- Since 2014 the percentage of children cycling or walking to school has steadily increased
 - Just over half of children in Cardiff use active modes of travel when going to school (51.5%)

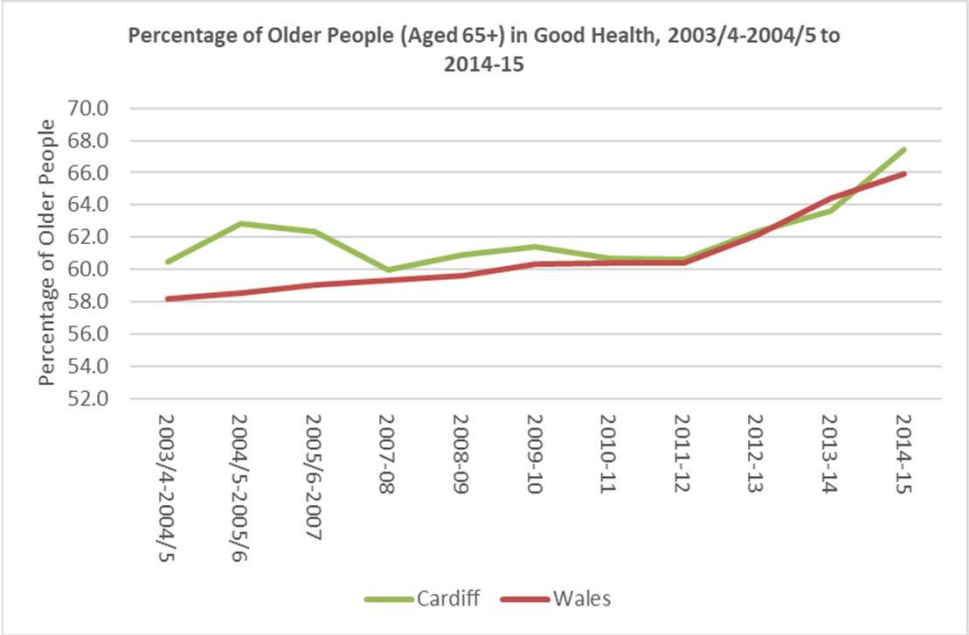
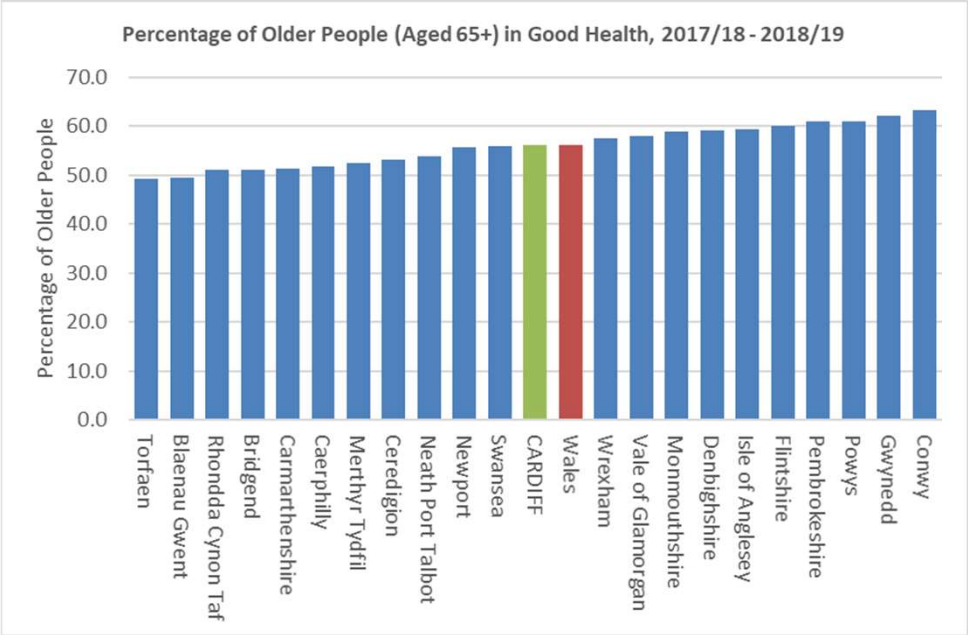

Percentage of people aged 65+ who reported their general health as being very good or good

- Key Points:**
- Just over half of older people aged 65+ in Cardiff (56.1%) consider themselves to be in good health (2018/19 figures).
 - Time series data (available up until 2014/15) shows improvement in recent years.
 - Historic data showed that at ward level, the 65 year old male healthy life expectancy inequality gap as 10.5 years and 12.1 years for females. Males in Adamsdown can expect to spend a quarter (24.8%) of their remaining life in good health compared to an expected two-thirds (65.4%) for those living in Lisvane. For females the figures are 23.5% and 56.9% respectively. Data is not available for this beyond 2013.

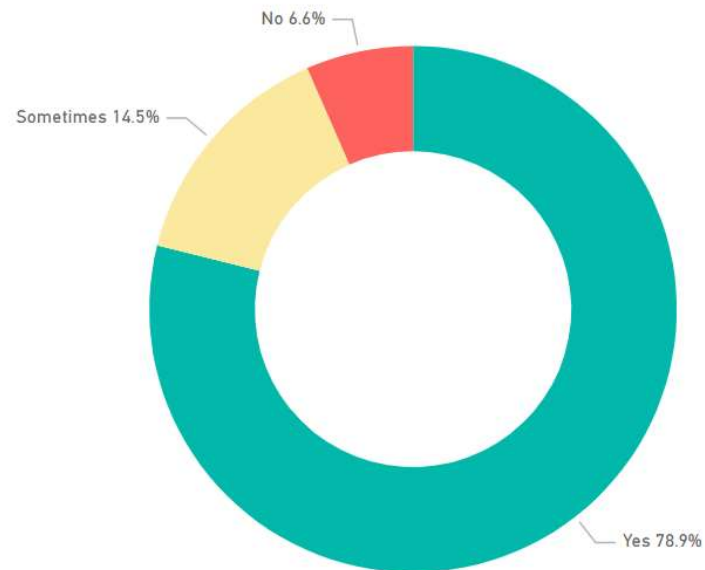


Percentage aged 65+ reporting they felt involved in decisions made about their care and support

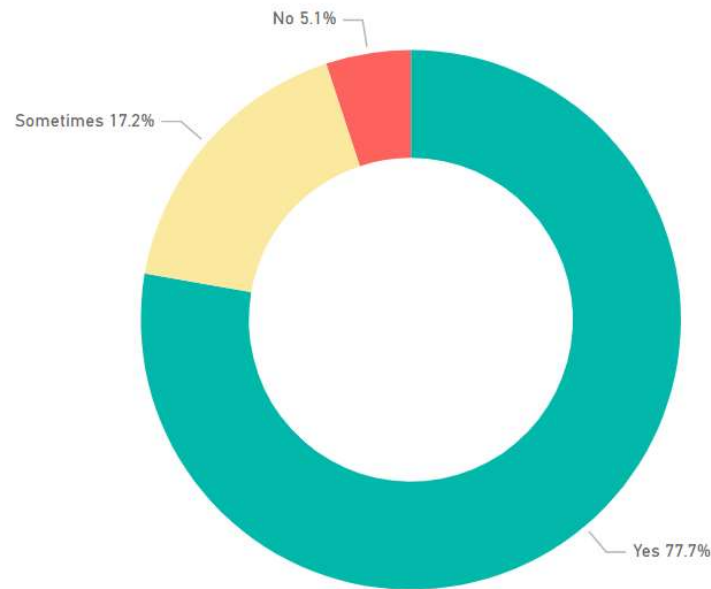

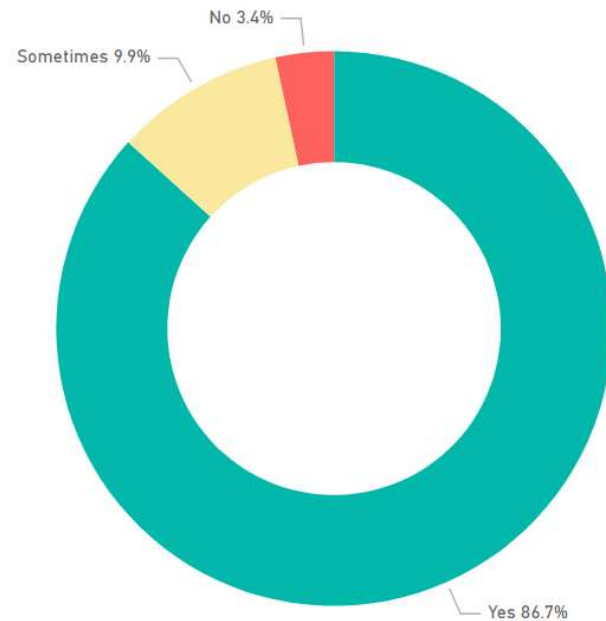

- Poverty is concentrated in the 'Southern Arc' of the city

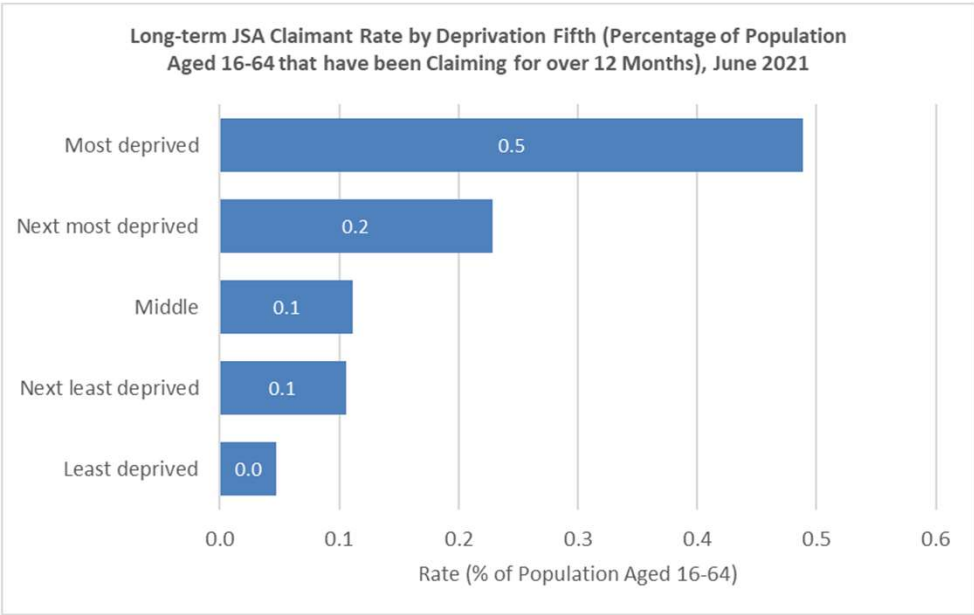
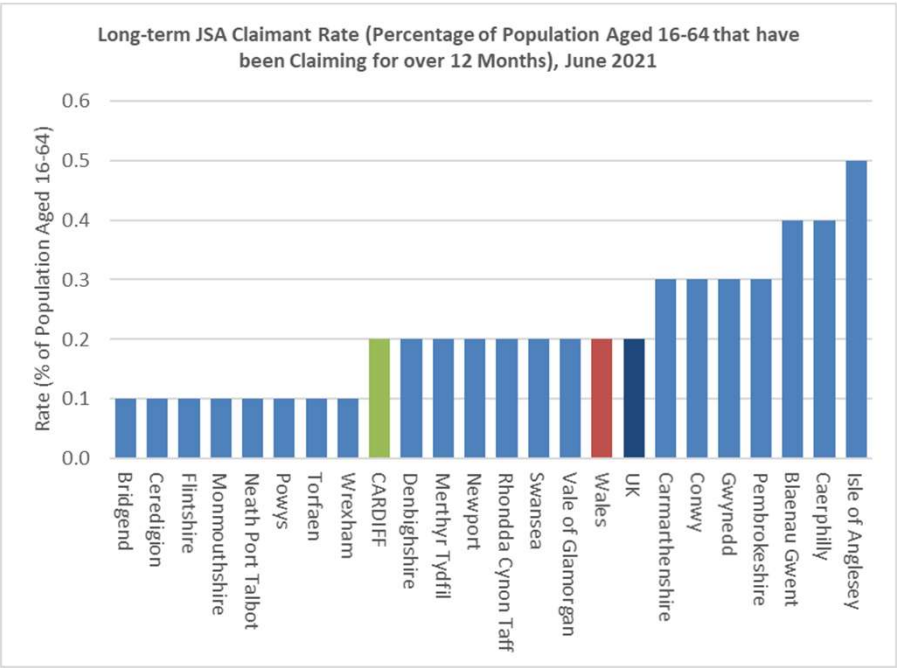

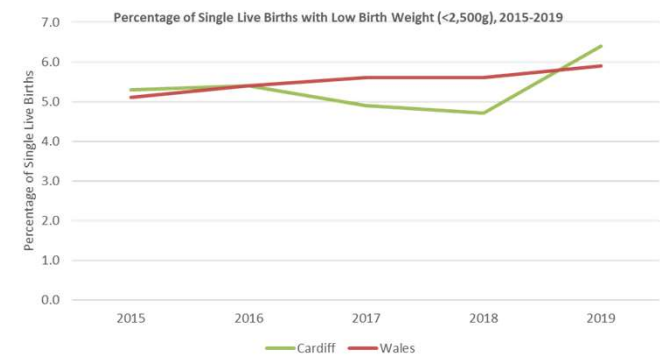
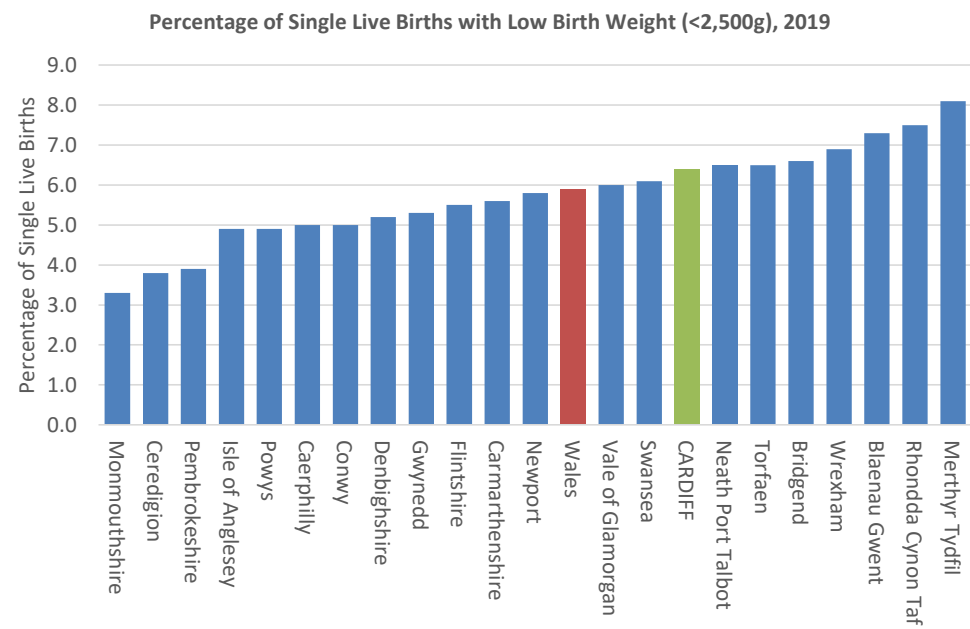
- Key Points:**

 - However, female healthy life expectancy is below the Wales average as a percentage of total life expectancy and mid-ranked amongst Welsh Local Authorities.



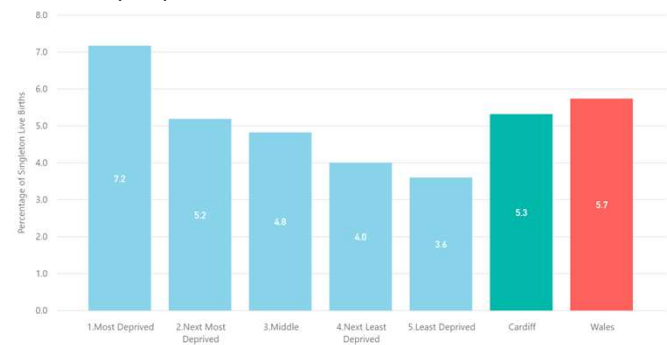

- Key Points:**
- Cardiff has moved above the Welsh average in the percentage of babies with low birth weight, having been significantly below average and one of Wales best performers for a number of years.
 - The percentage of low birth weight babies is twice as high in the most deprived areas compared to the least deprived, 7.2% and above the Wales average.



Percentage of Singleton Live Births with Low Birth Weight (<2,500g): Cardiff by Deprivation Fifth, 2017-19

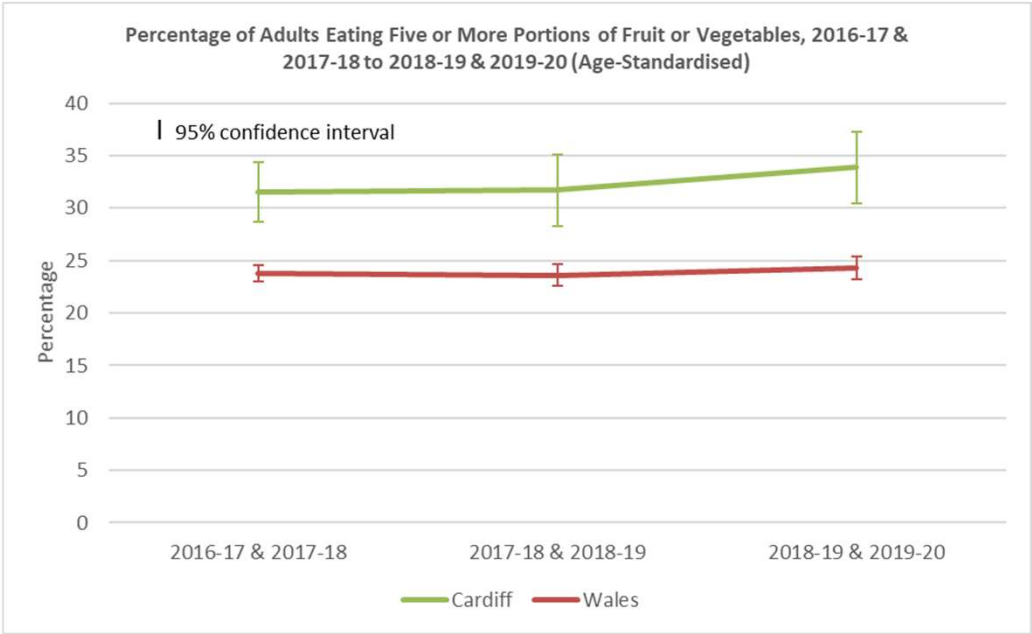
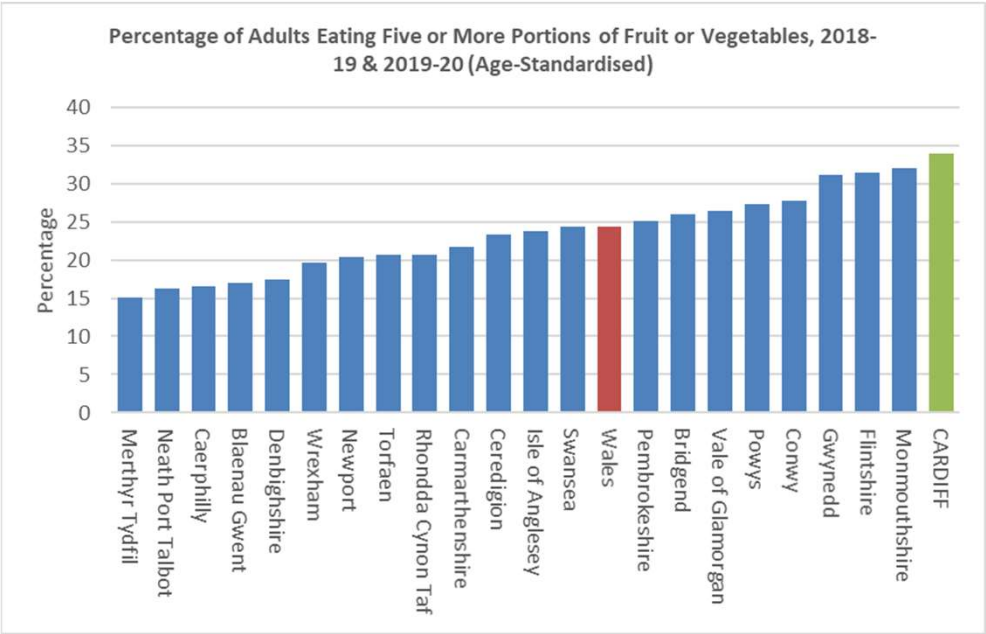

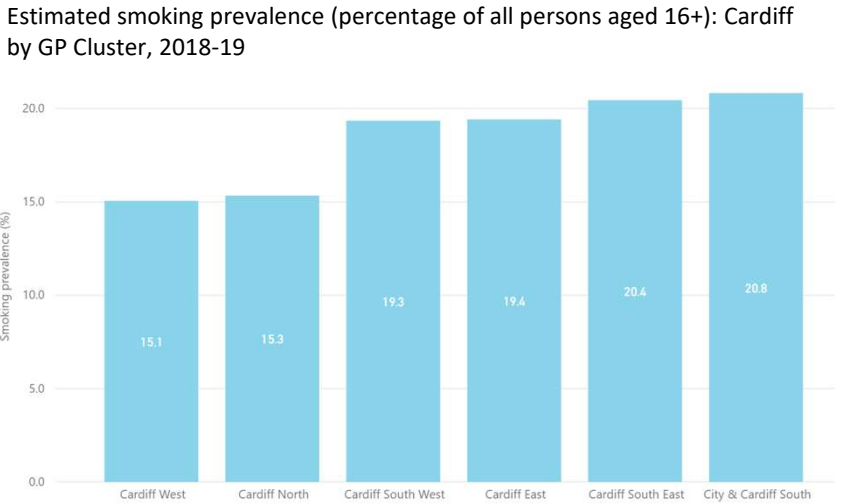
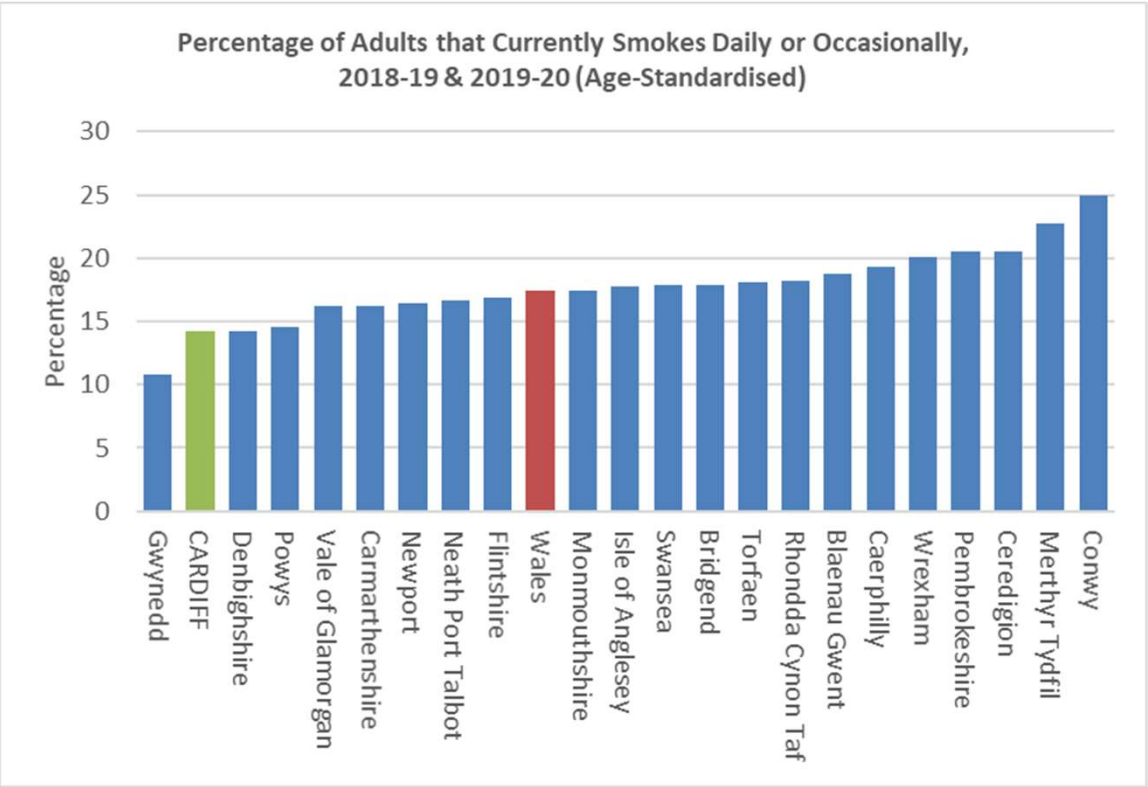
- Cardiff is in the top quartile for levels of physical activity in Wales. However, 29% are active less than 30 minutes a week.

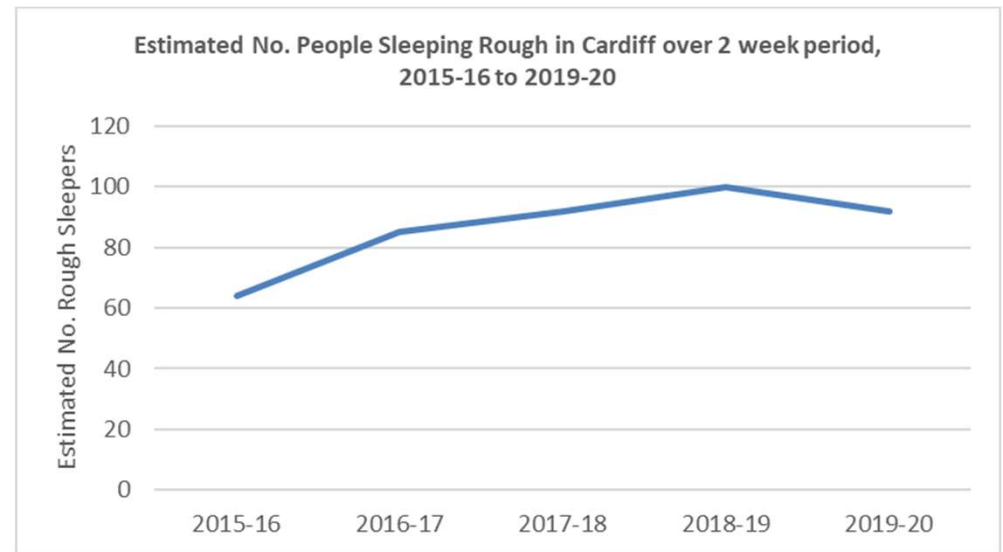
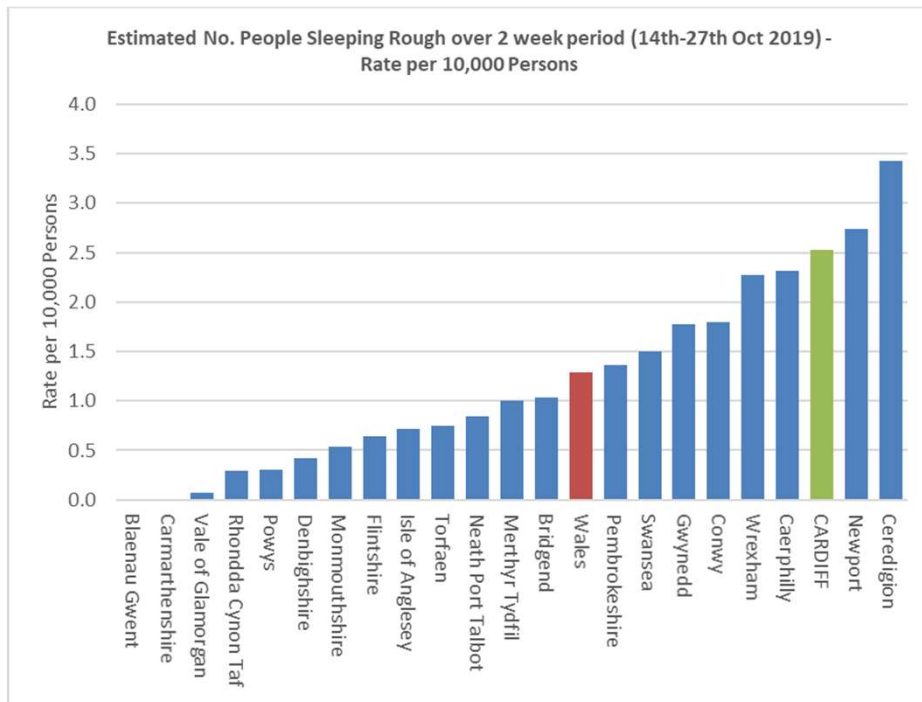
- Housing in Cardiff is the second least affordable amongst the UK’s Core Cities, just behind Bristol.
- Property costs over seven and a half times the median gross annual earnings
- Having being the sixth least affordable local authority in Wales in 2019, Cardiff is now second, just behind the Vale of Glamorgan and well above the Wales average.

- Cardiff has the 3rd highest estimated rate across Welsh LAs, behind Newport and Ceredigion
- Since 2016/17, estimated numbers of rough sleepers in Cardiff over a 2 week period have increased with a small drop in 2019/20 from 100 to 92

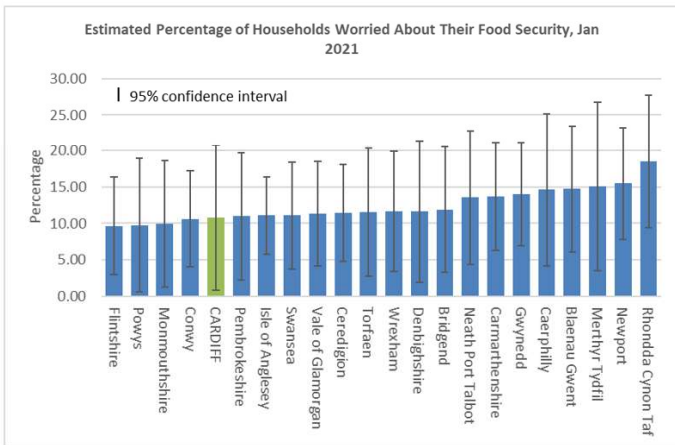
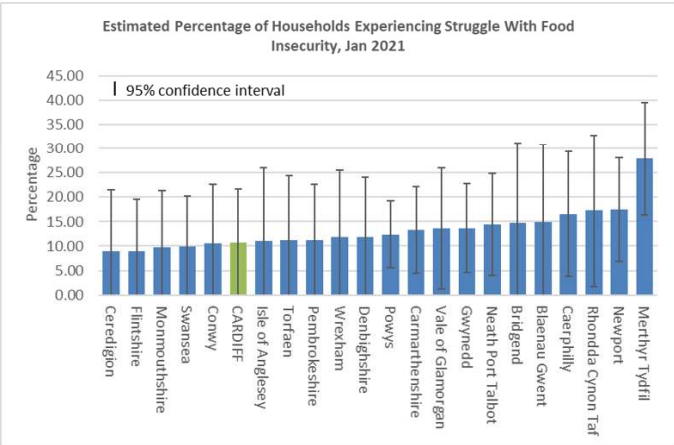
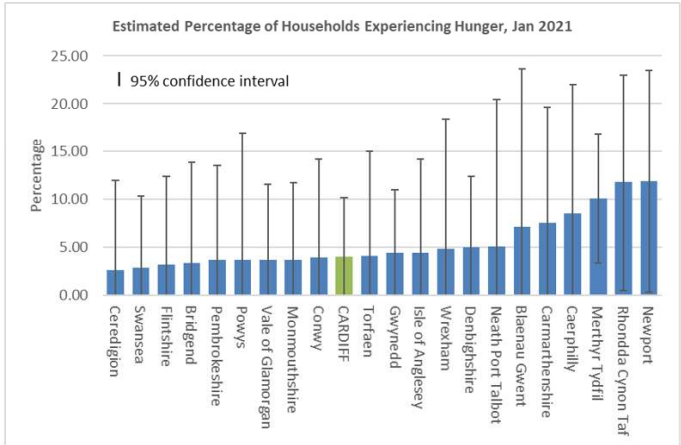
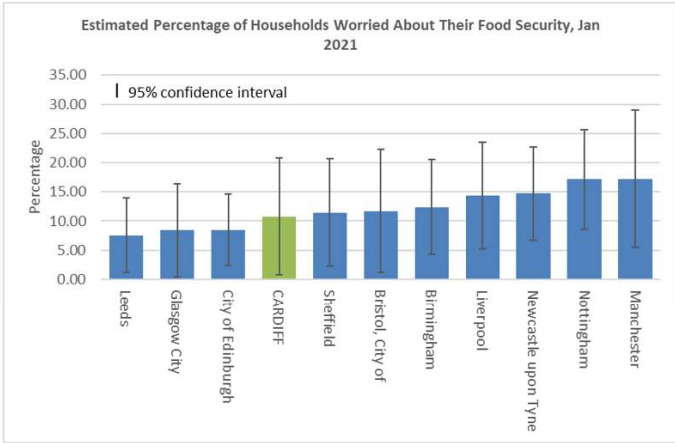
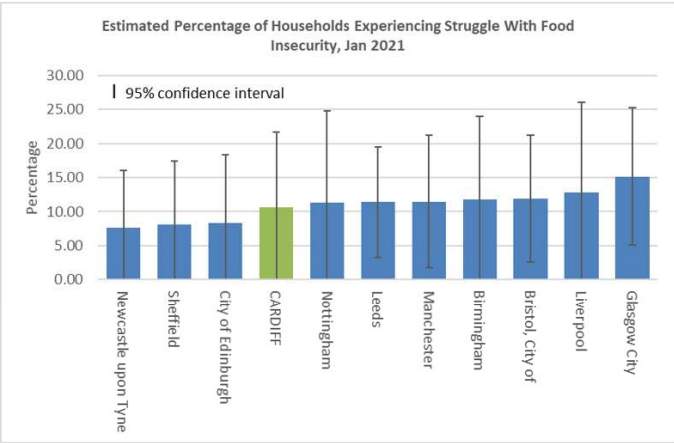
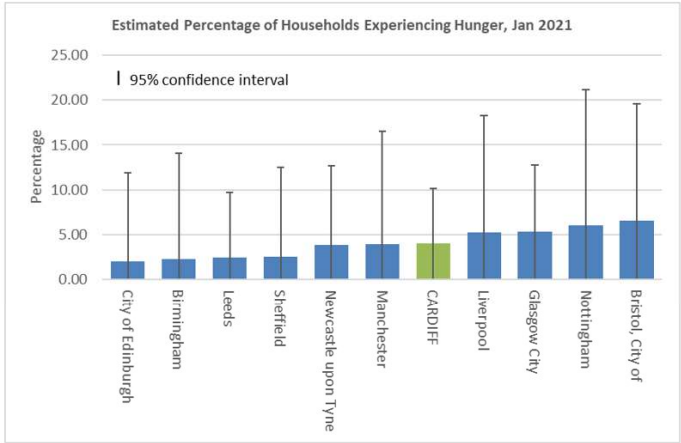

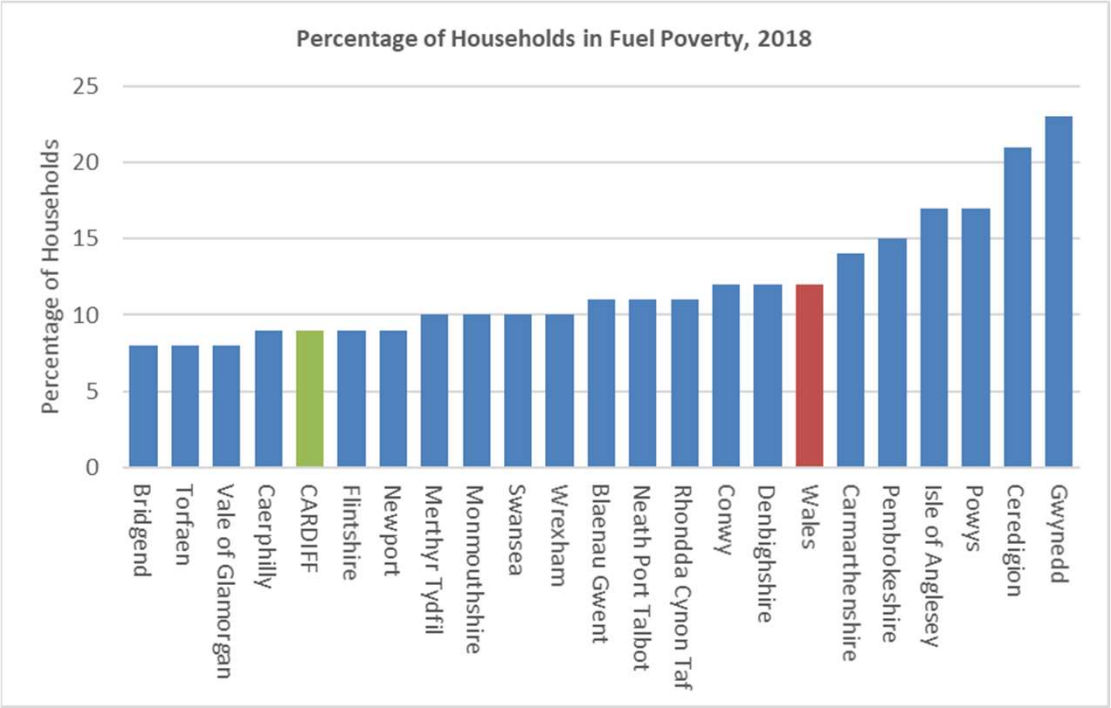
- Cardiff is mid-low ranking in terms of households experiencing food poverty

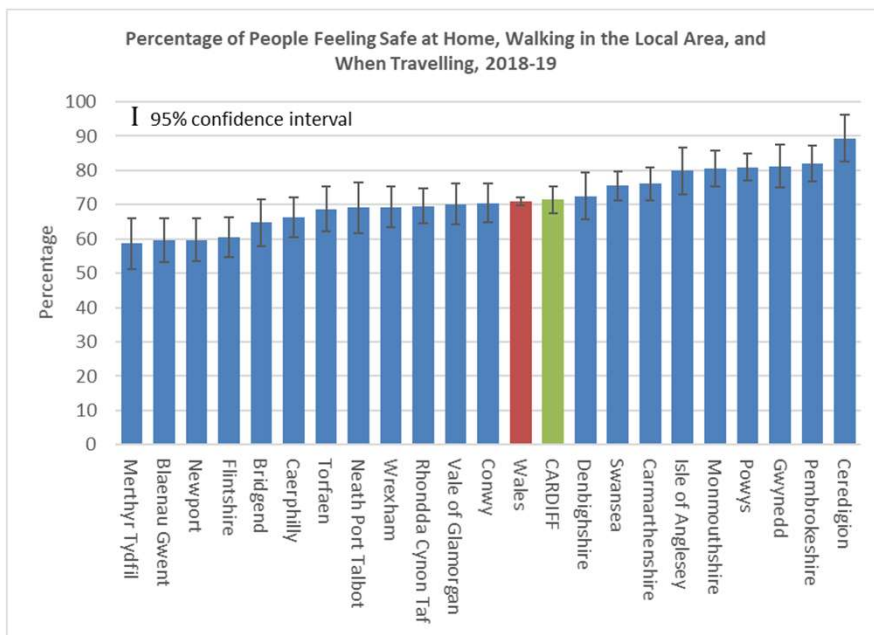

Key Points:

- Cardiff is mid-ranked among Welsh Local Authorities for feeling safe when travelling (National Survey for Wales 2018/19)
- Respondents living in the most deprived areas of the city are more likely to feel unsafe compared to those living in the least deprived areas of the city. (Ask Cardiff Survey 2016-18)
- Less than half of respondents felt safe walking in the city centre after dark with the percentage dropping from 44.2% in 2017 to 37% in 2020. In 2020, only 25% of respondents with a disability and 30% of female respondents felt safe. (Ask Cardiff Survey 2020)

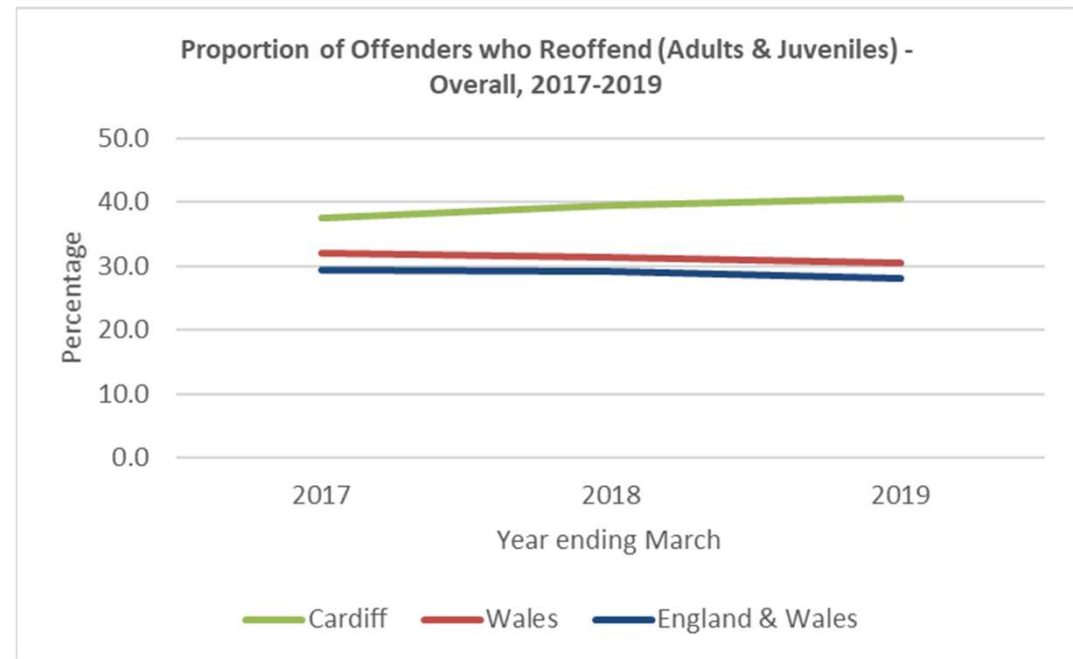
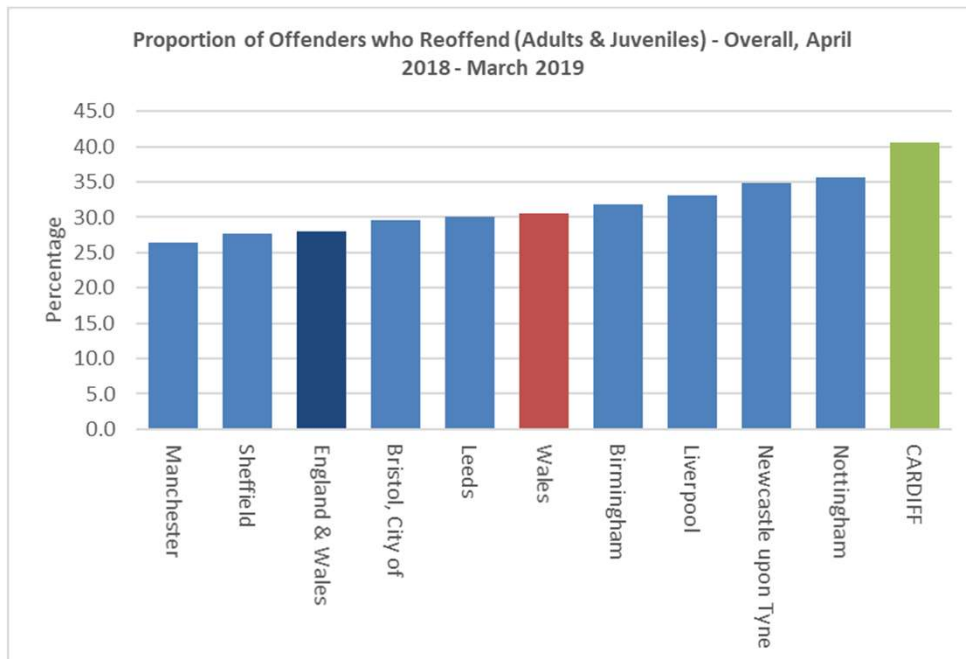

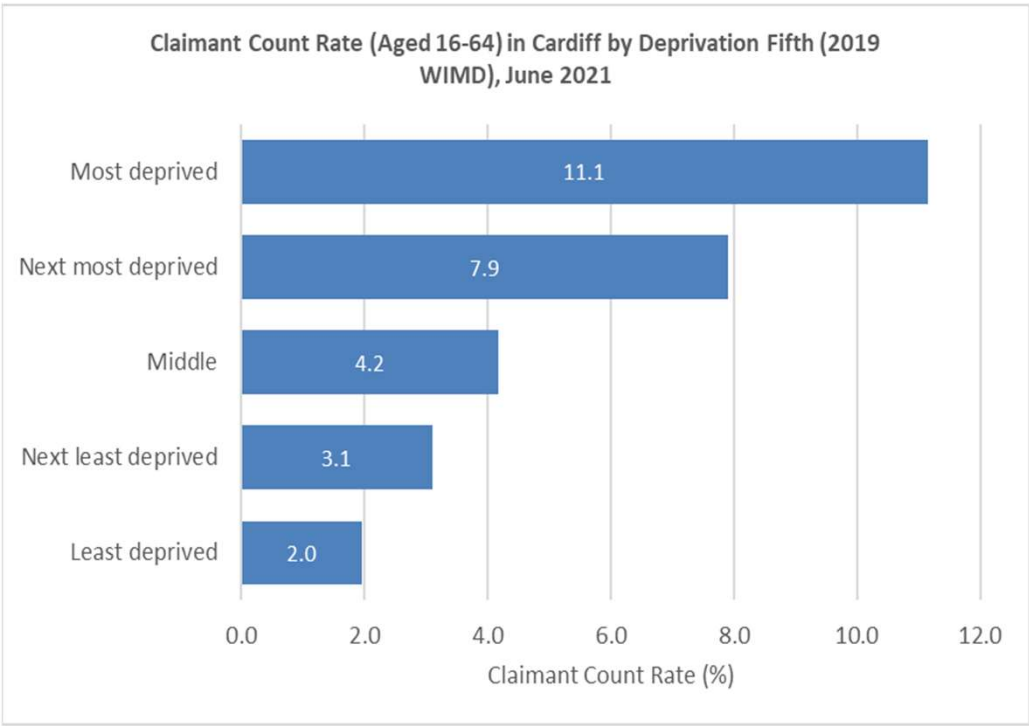
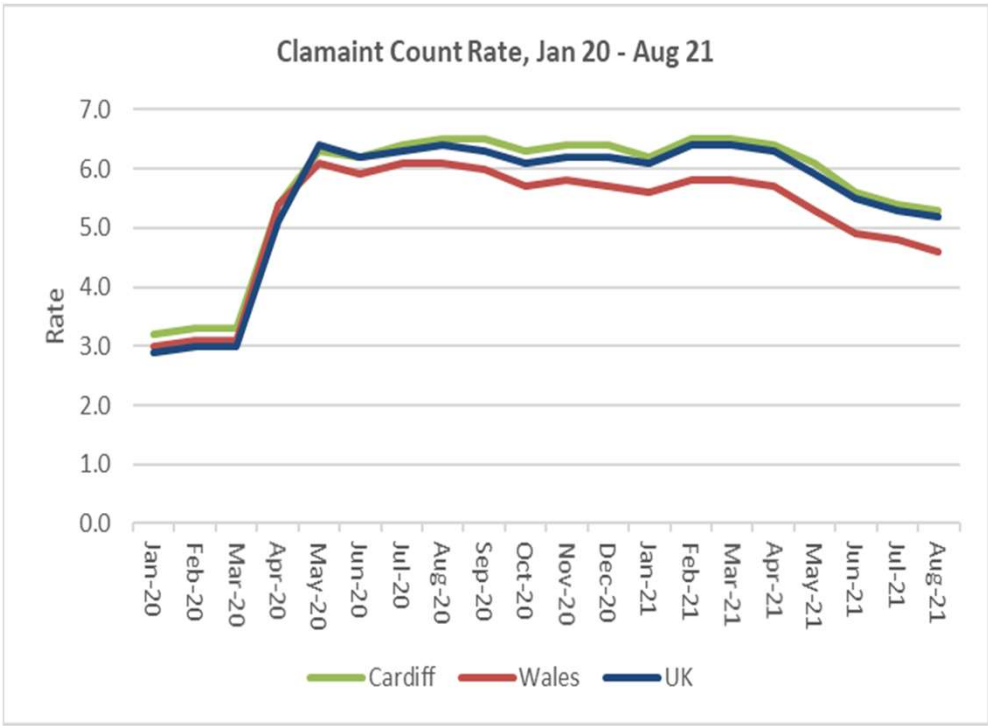
Unemployment rate of the economically active population age 16+

- Key Points:**
- The unemployment rate in Cardiff in 2020 was 3.8%, just above the Welsh average of 3.7%, but well below the Great Britain average and the rates seen in other Core Cities.
 - Since reaching a high of 10.3% in 2012, unemployment in Cardiff has seen a general downward trend, with only one spike in 2017.
 - Since the last Well-being assessment, the unemployment has fallen from 6% (2016) to 3.8%.



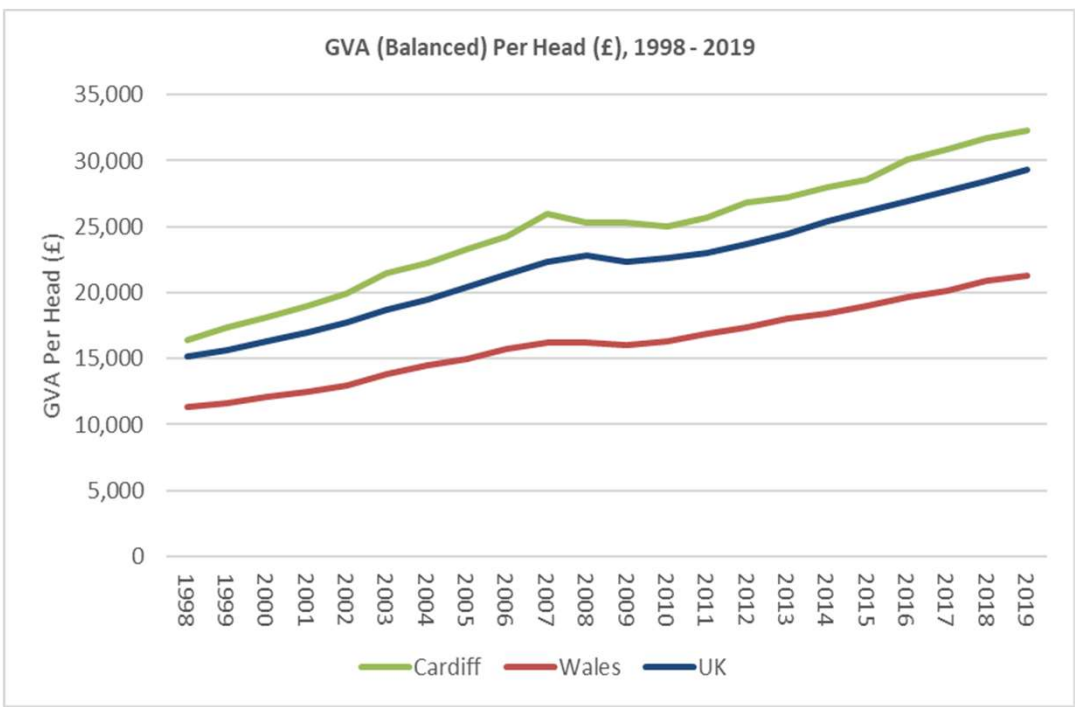
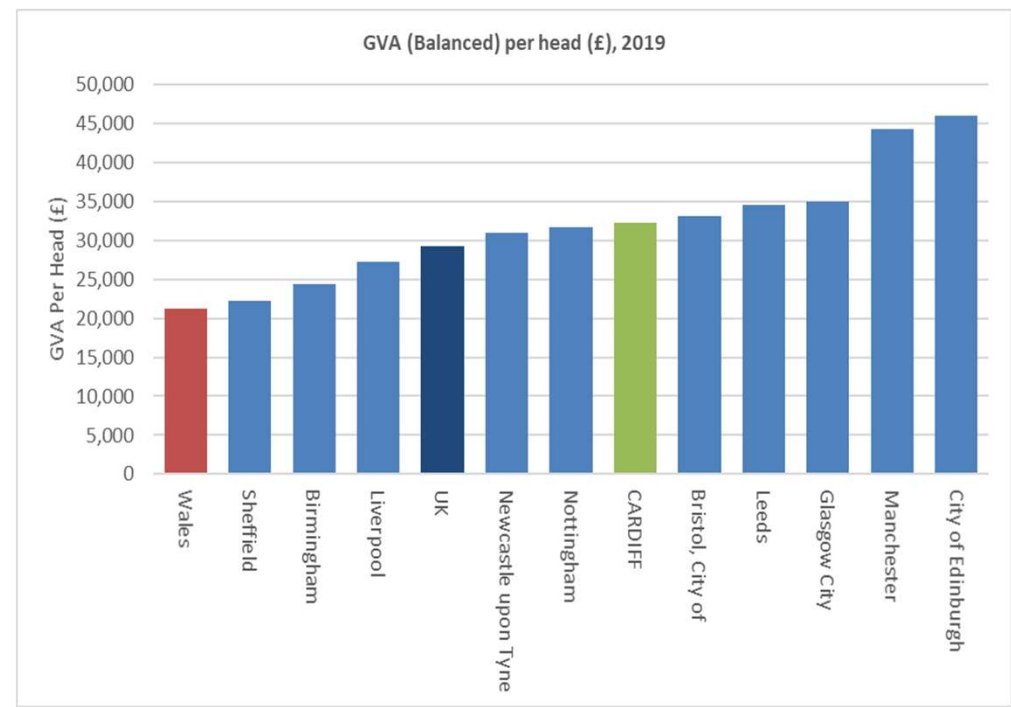
Unemployment rate of the economically active population age 16+ (cont'd)

- Key Points:**
- In 2020, the pandemic’s impact on economic activity caused the claimant count rate in Cardiff to double in the spring of 2020.
 - This impact was not felt evenly, with claimant count rate being 9.2 percentage points higher for the most deprived fifth of the population compared to the least deprived fifth.
 - This rate has been on a downward trajectory May 2021 and sits just above the UK average.



GVA per head in Cardiff

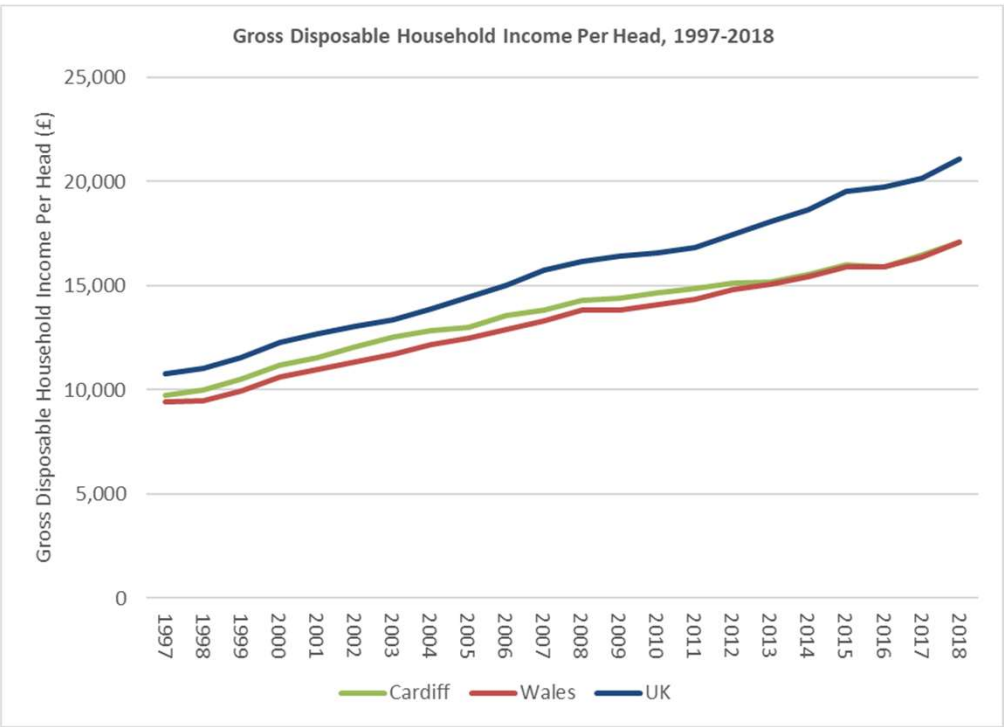
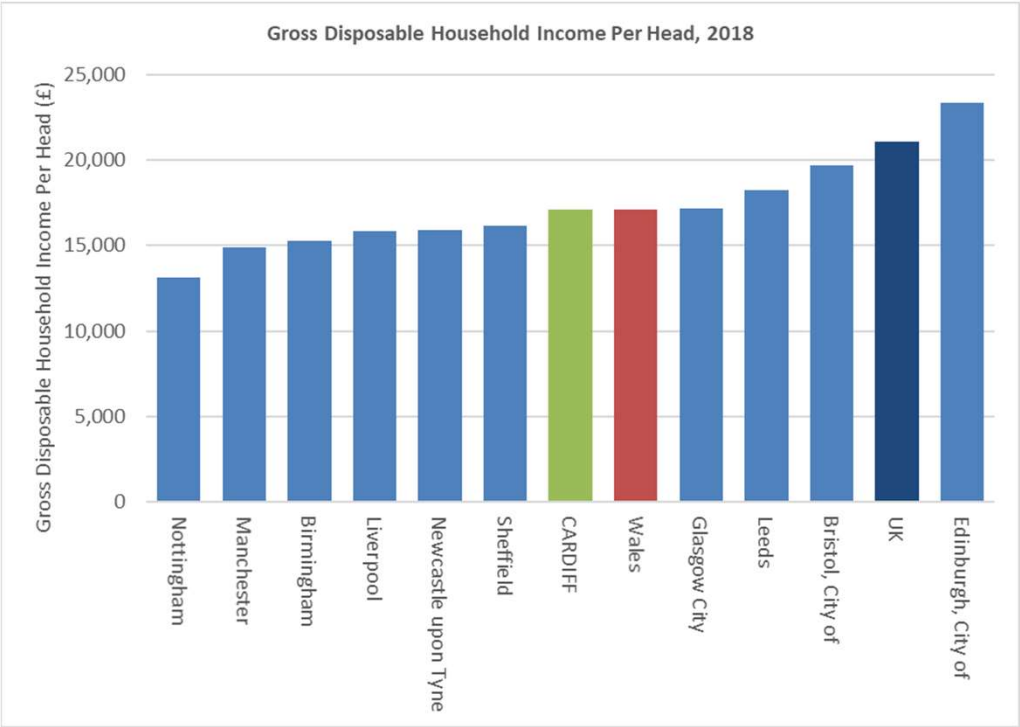
- Key Points:**
- In 2019, GVA per head in Cardiff stood at £32,333, well above the Welsh average and slightly exceeding the UK average.
 - However, the large gap in GVA per head between Cardiff and certain Core Cities, namely Manchester and Edinburgh, reveals that Cardiff needs to make progress in this area.
 - Between 2015 and 2019, GVA per head in Cardiff rose by roughly 13% and consistently remained above the Wales and UK averages.



Gross Disposable Household Income per head

Key Points:

- In 2018, gross disposable household income in Cardiff stood at £17,095, virtually equal to the Welsh average, but significantly lower than the UK average and the level seen in certain Core Cities, namely Bristol and Edinburgh.
- Between 2015 and 2018, gross disposable household income in Cardiff rose by 6.7%, slightly below the roughly 8% increase in the UK average during the same period.
- Over the last 20 years, gross disposable income in Cardiff has been on a general increasing trajectory, however the rate of increase has decelerated since 2008-09, coinciding with the global financial crisis.

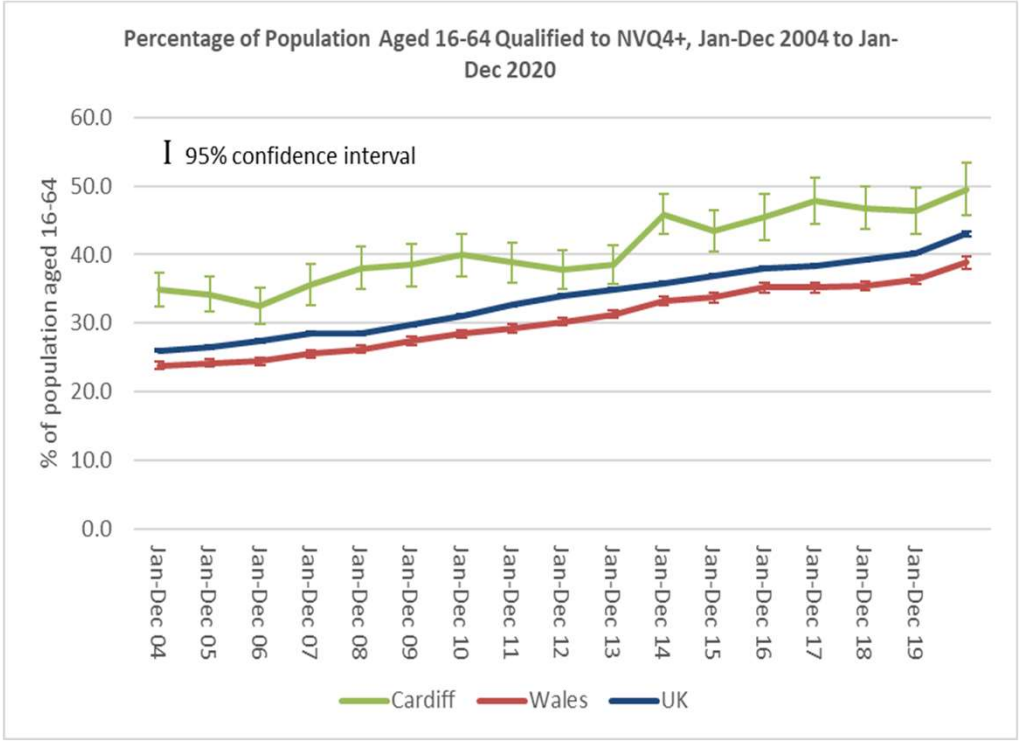
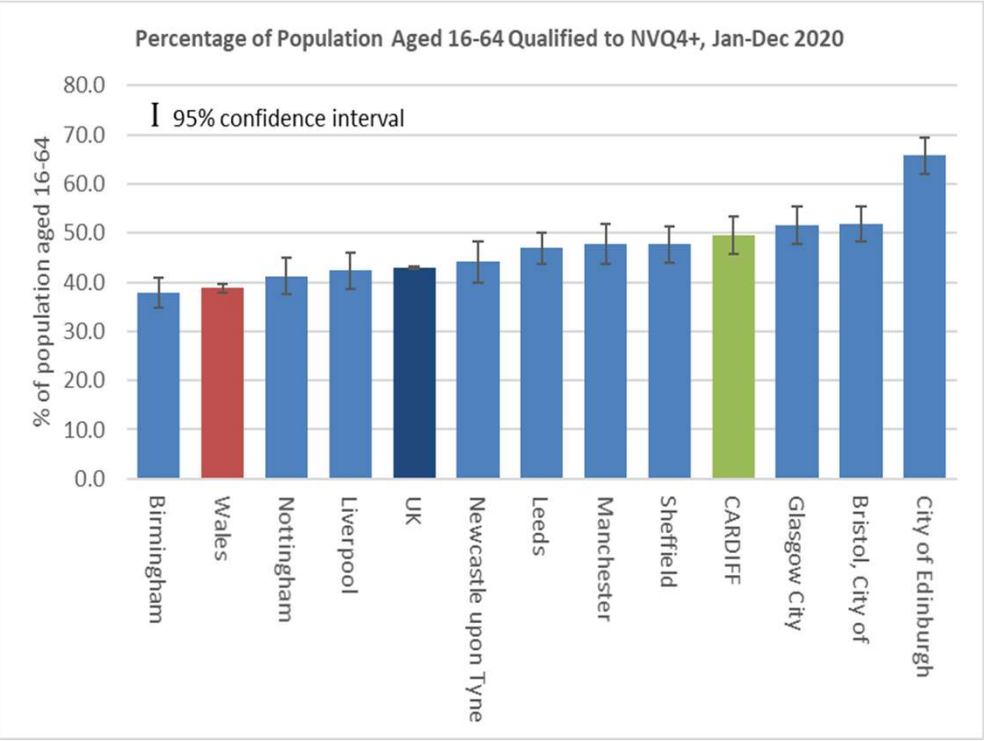
Key Points:

- In 2020, the percentage of employee jobs with hourly pay below the living wage stood at 15.4%.
- This percentage is significantly below the UK and Wales averages, below the majority of other Core Cities and below all other local authorities in Wales.
- Between 2019 and 2020, the percentage of employee jobs with hourly pay below the living wage decreased by just over 2 percentage points
- This data reflects the success of Cardiff's Real Living Wage movement.

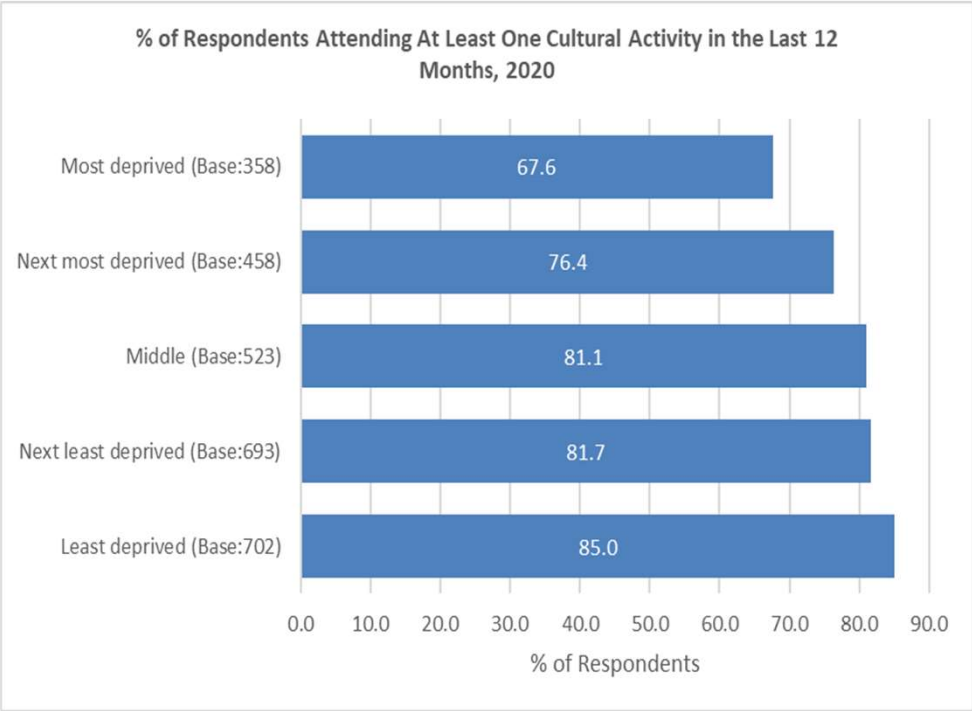
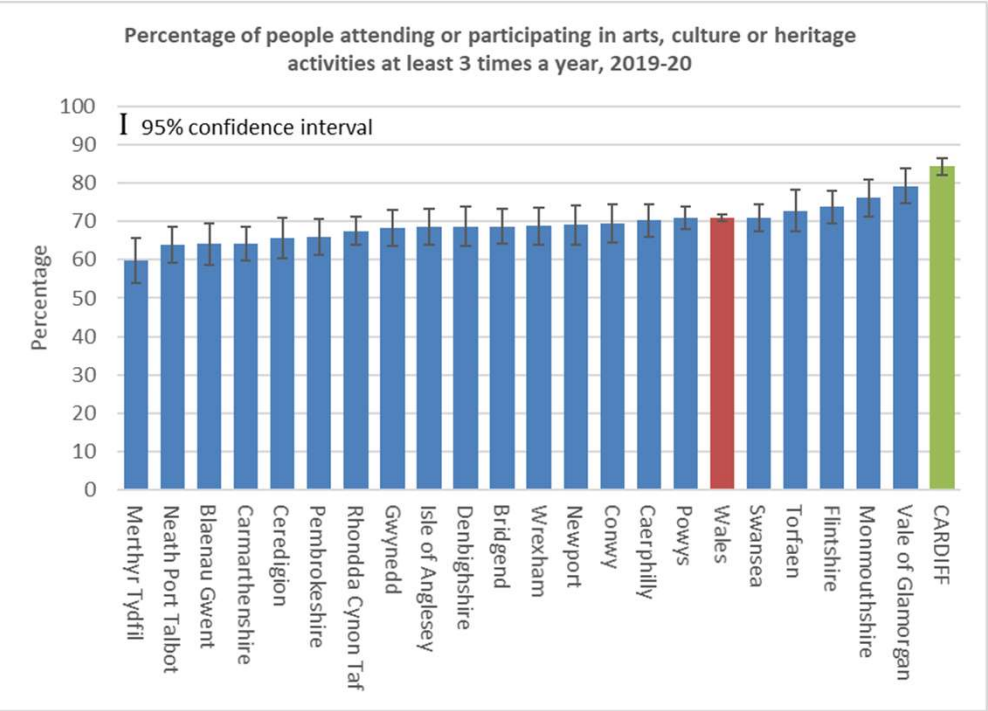
- Key Points:**
- In 2020, the percentage of Cardiff's adult population qualified to degree level or equivalent stood at just below 50%, comfortably above the Welsh and UK averaged, and above the majority of other Core Cities.
 - Between 2015 and 2020, this percentage was on a broadly increasing trajectory in Cardiff, and overall, it rose by 14%.
 - Since 2004, the percentage of people qualified to degree level in Cardiff has remained consistently above the Wales and UK averages.

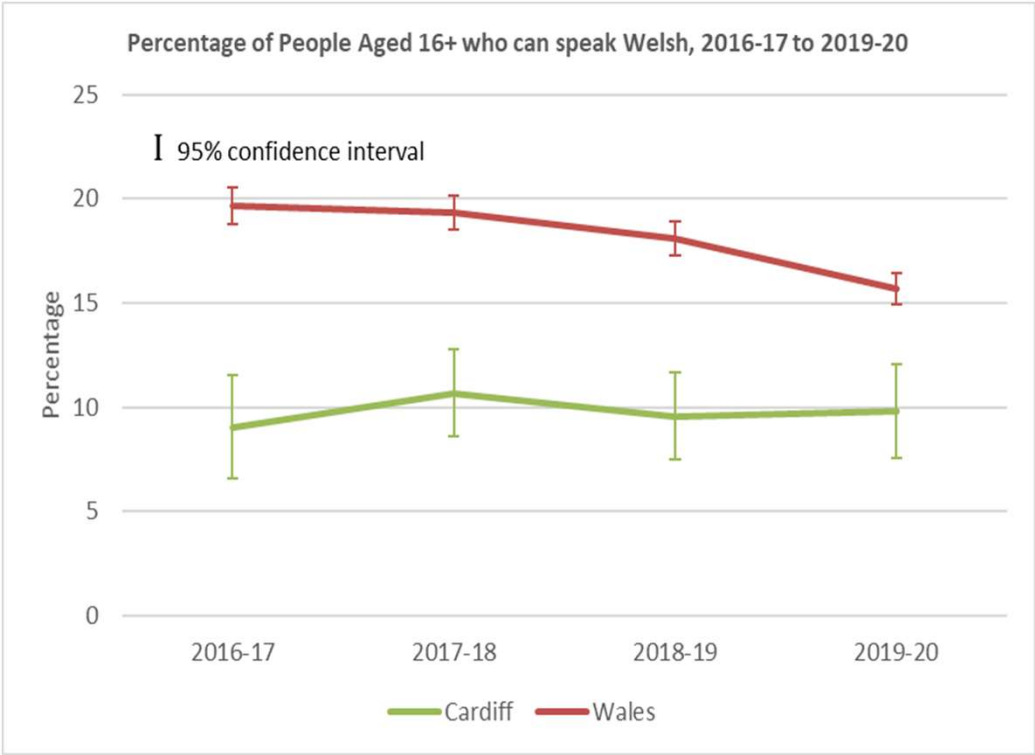
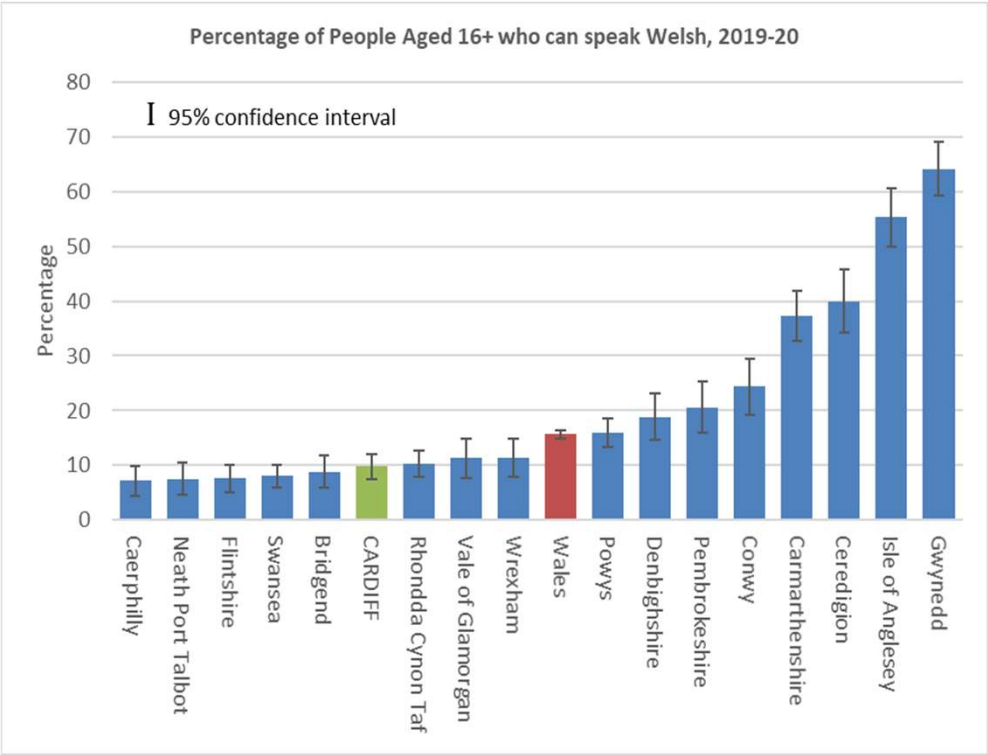
- In 2019-20, Cardiff led Wales in the percentage of its residents participating in cultural life, at 84%.
- This rate represents a marginal 1% increase relative to 2017-18, and exceeds the Welsh average by 13 percentage points.
- The most and least deprived fifths of Cardiff’s population are separated by 17.4 percentage points in terms of participation in at least one cultural activity in the past year, with the latter’s attendance being higher.



Percentage of people aged 16+ who can speak Welsh

Key Points:

- At 10%, the percentage of people aged 16+ in Cardiff who can speak Welsh falls below the Welsh average of 16%.
- The percentage of Welsh speakers in Cardiff remained relatively static between 2016-17 and 2019-20, rising from 9% to 10% during this period.

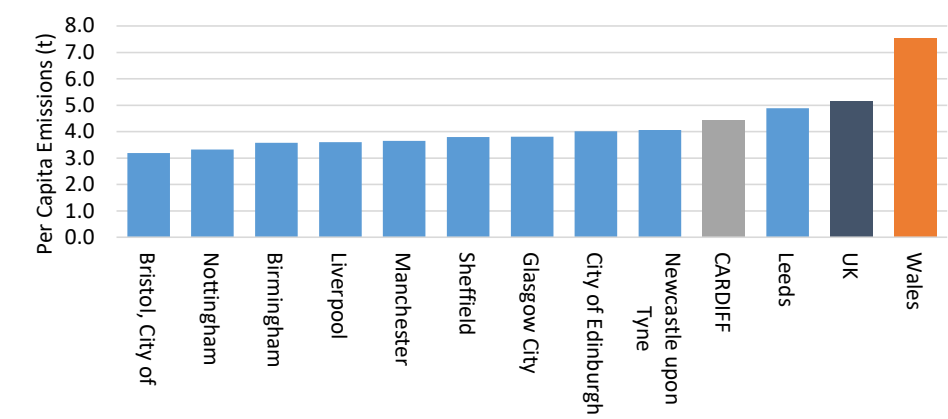


Per Capita CO2 Emissions

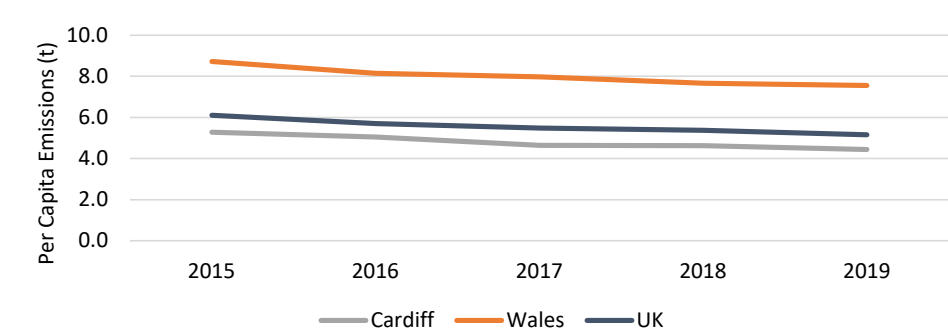
Key Points:

- BEIS data shows that Cardiff has the second highest figure for CO2 emissions per capita out of the UK's 'Core Cities'.
- However, Cardiff's emissions have reduced since 2015, from 5.3t to 4.4t, and have been consistently below overall figures for the UK and Wales.
- Transport contributes the most to CO2 emissions, at 41.2%.

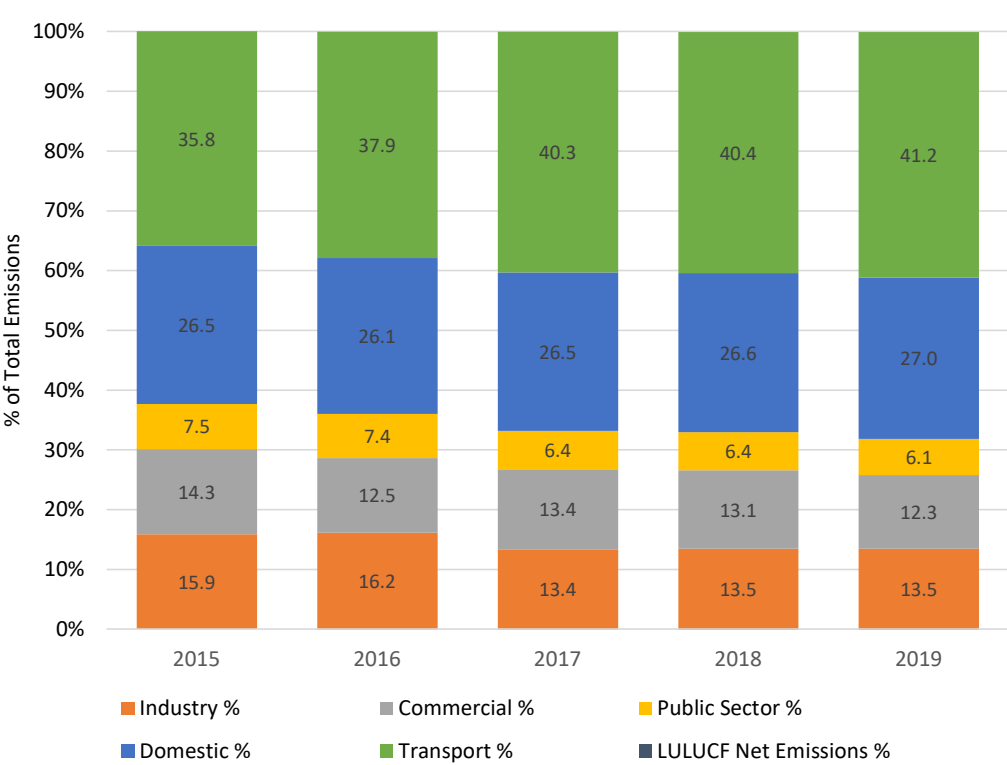
Total Per Capita CO2 Emissions (t), 2019

Cardiff CO2 Emissions by Main Emission Type (% of Total Emissions), 2015-2019

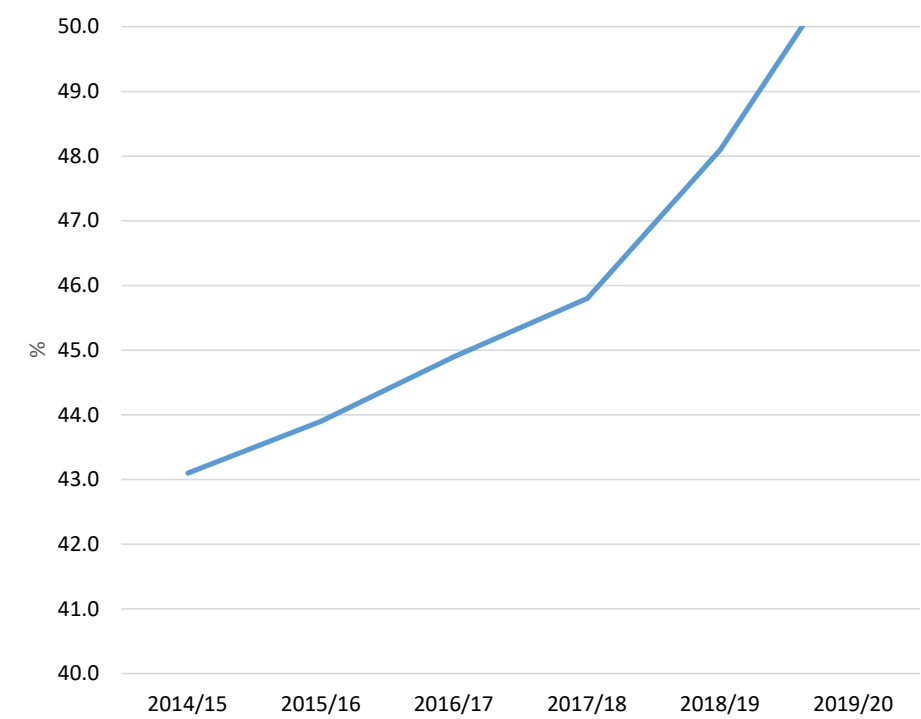

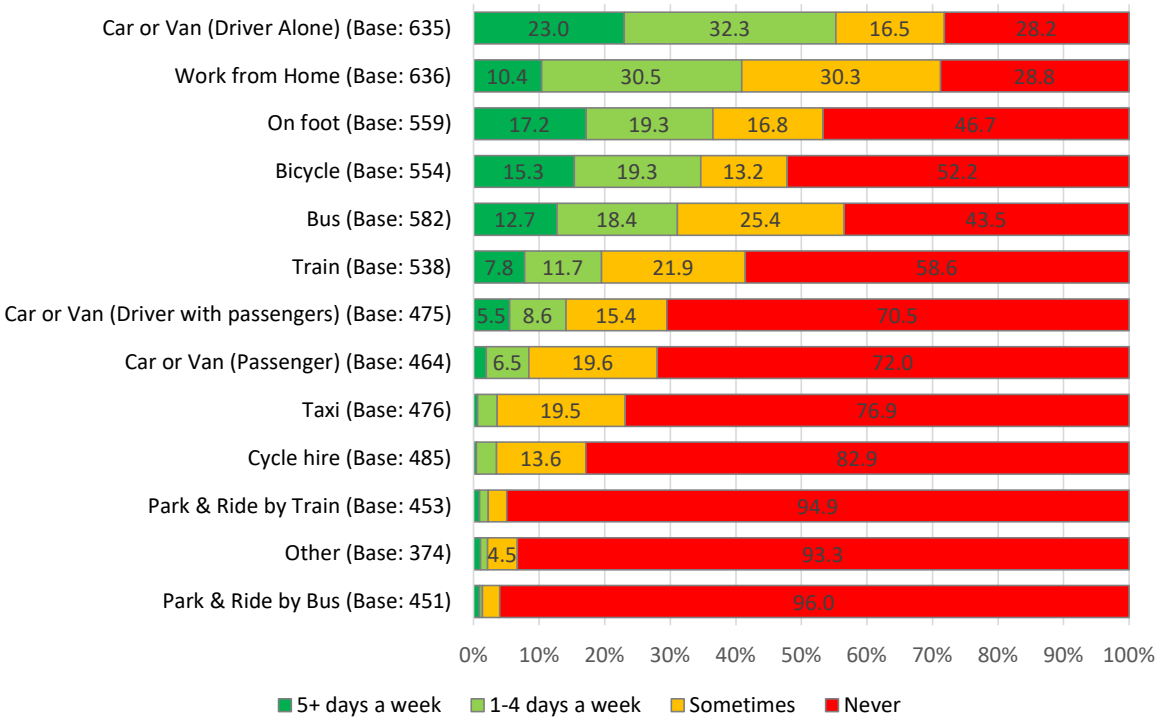
Key Points:

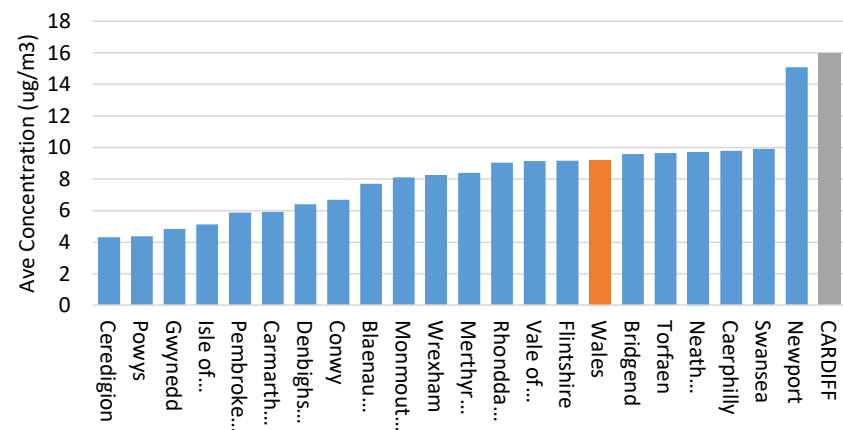

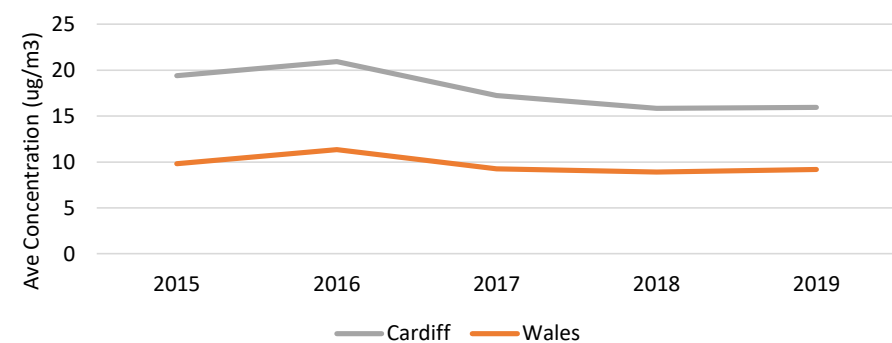
Pollution Levels in the Air: Nitrogen Dioxide (NO2)

- Key Points:**
- Cardiff has the highest NO2 pollution levels in Wales, with high levels of pollution concentrated in and around the city centre and the stretch of the M4 near Whitchurch and Tongwynlais.
 - Cardiff's NO2 levels have slightly decreased since 2015, from 19µg/m3 to 16µg/m3

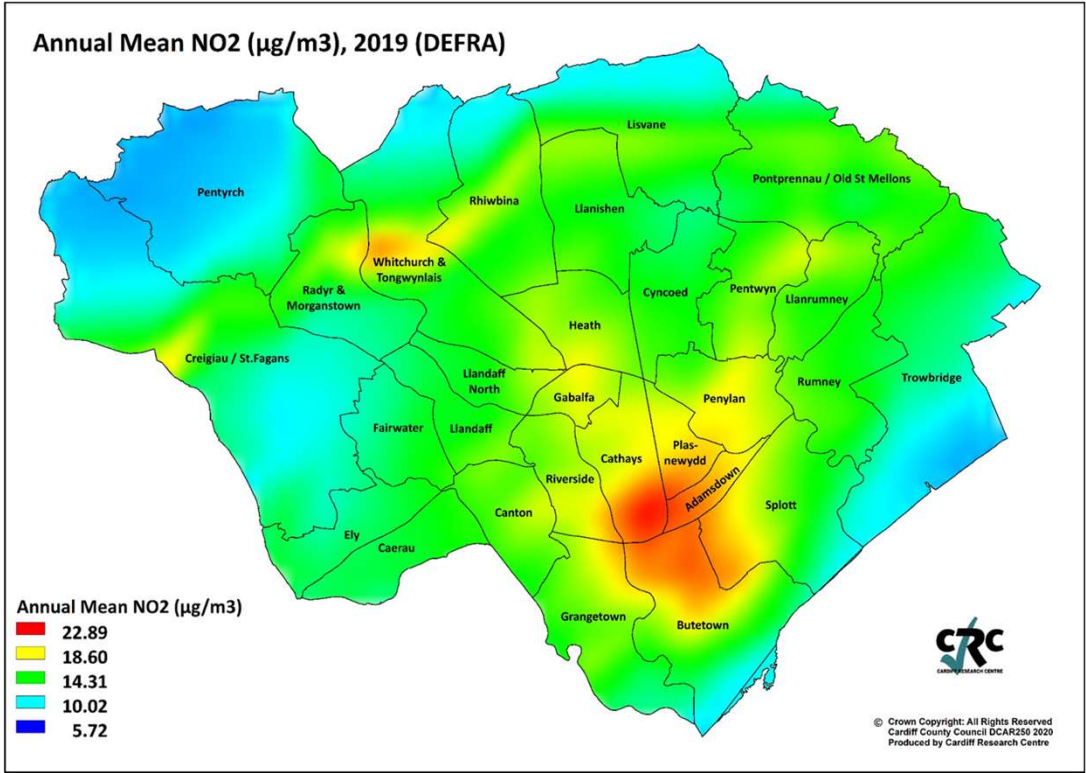
Average NO2 Concentration at Residential Dwelling Locations (µg/m3), 2019

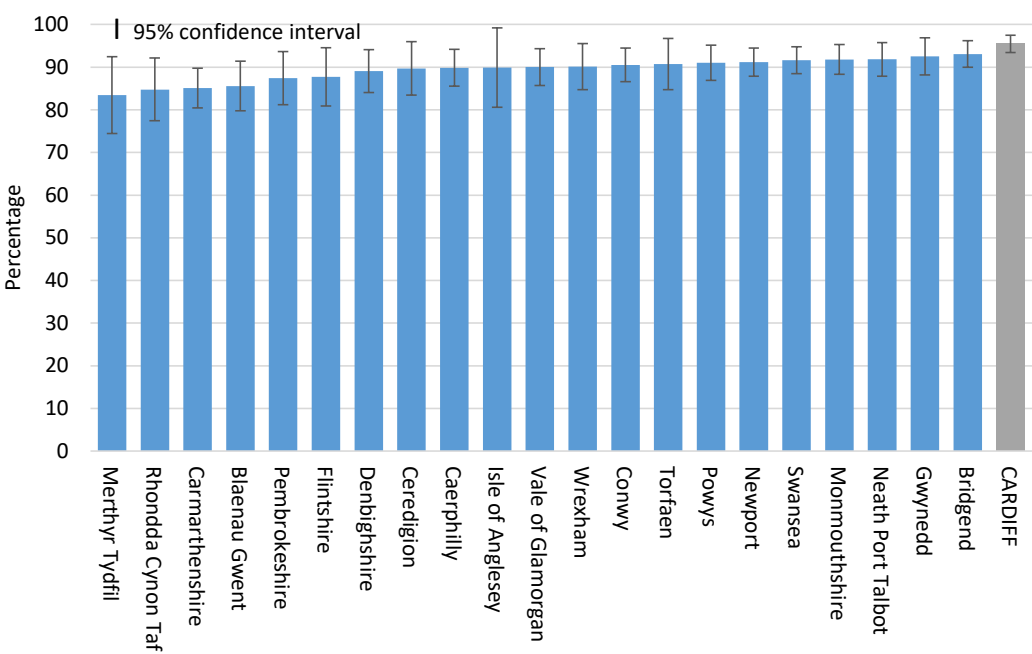
- Key Points:**

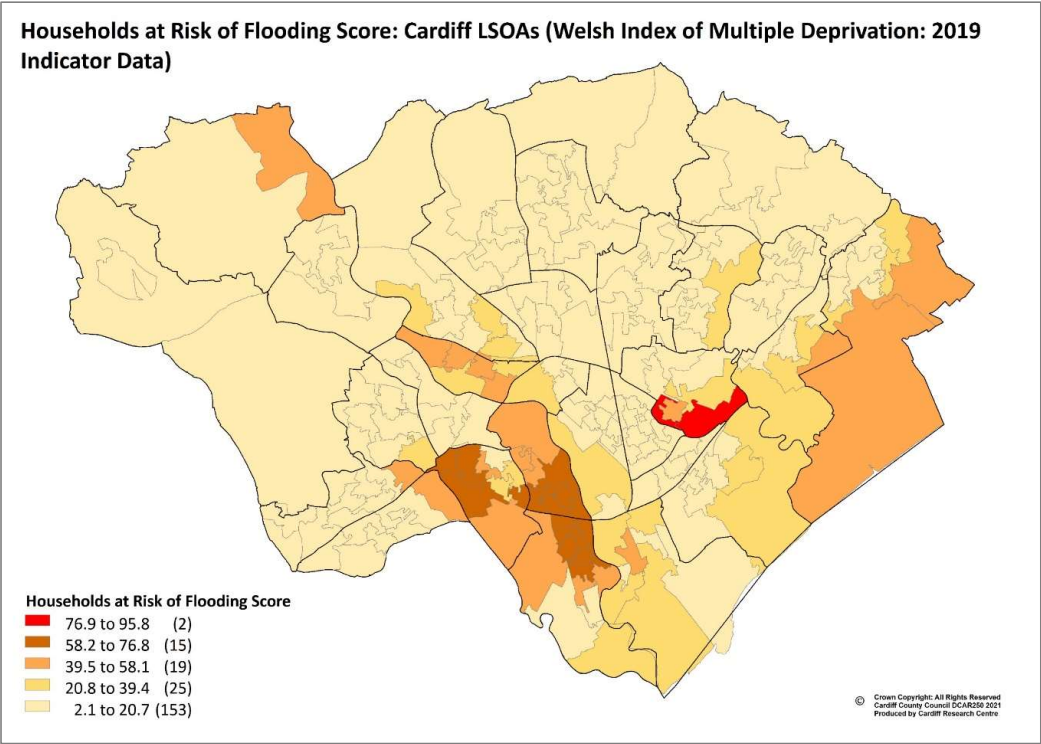

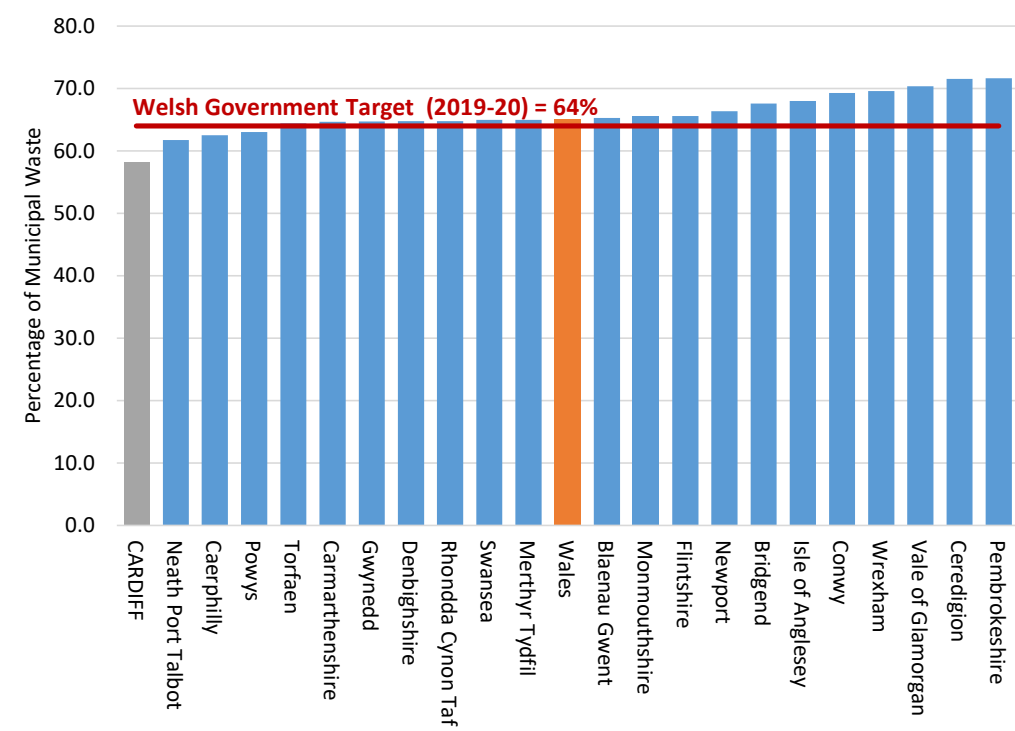

Municipal Waste Reuse/ Recycling/ Composing Rates

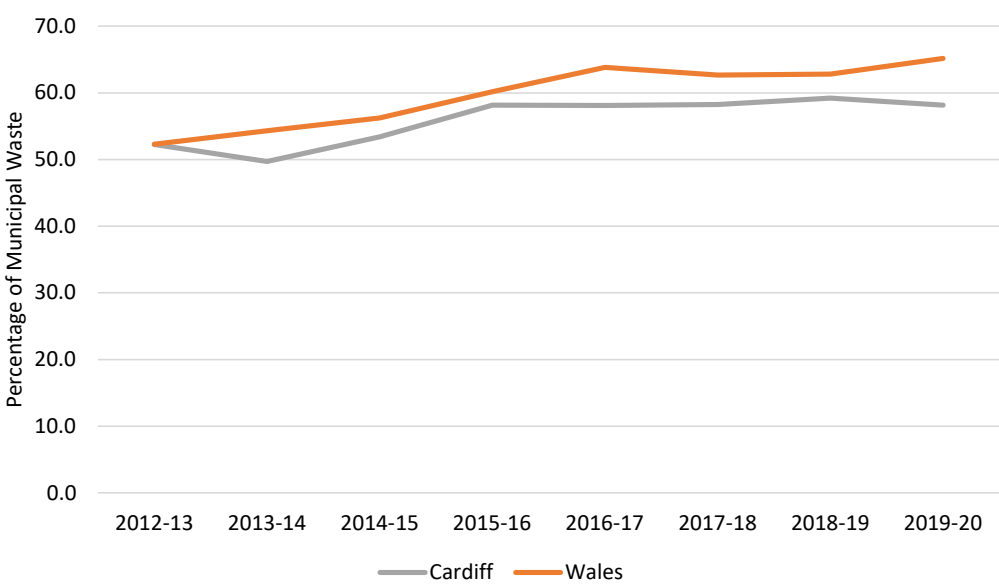
Key Points:

- Cardiff is the worst performing local authority in Wales. The gap between Cardiff and the Wales average has widened in recent years.
- Cardiff's rate has remained fairly stagnant since 2015/16 - in 2015/16, the percentage of municipal waste reused/ recycled/ composted was 58.4%, whereas in 2019/20 it was 58.1%. This is below Welsh Government's target of 64%.

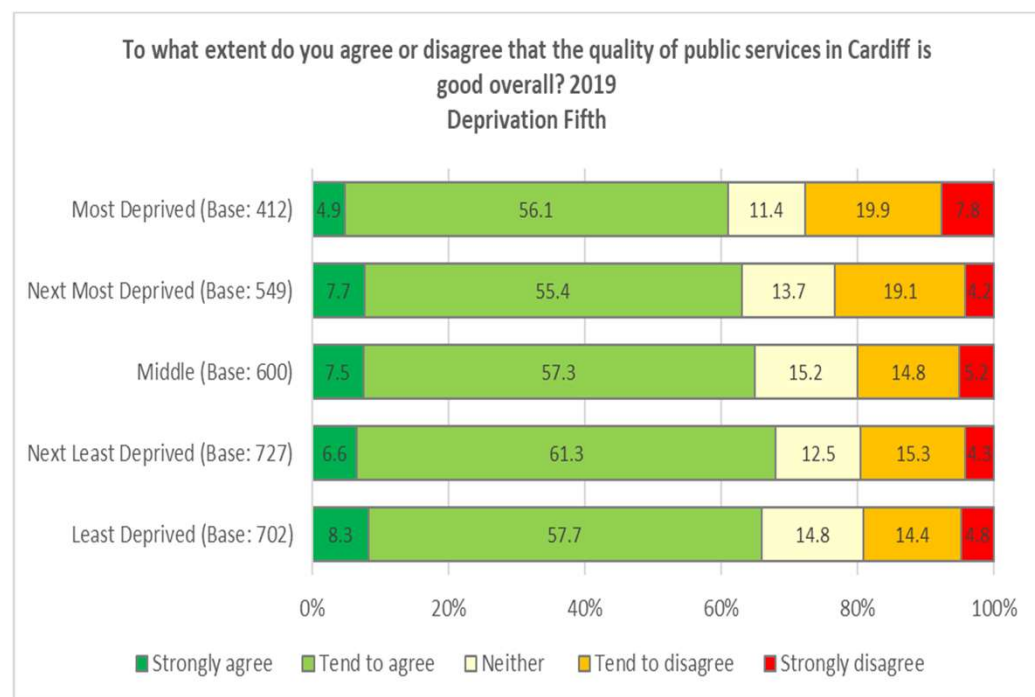


How satisfied are you with the quality of public services in Cardiff? (by Deprivation Fifth)

Key Points:

- Satisfaction with the quality of public services in Cardiff is broadly consistent across deprivation fifths, reflecting the Council's commitment to making good quality services accessible to all communities across the city.
- Four of the five groups reported higher satisfaction levels from 2019 to 2020, with the level of satisfaction for the other group falling only 0.4%.
